



Fr. Marlon's Reflections - FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

(2Sam 5:1-3; Col 1:12-20; Luke 23:35-43)



First, THE RULERS. Having habitually used power for their own benefit, they now wanted Jesus to prove that he was the Messiah by using his power to save himself.

They said: "He saved others, let him save himself if he is the chosen one, the Messiah of God."

Second, THE SOLDIERS. Like their bosses, they taunted Jesus. They said: "If you are King of the Jews, save yourself." They could not do otherwise because their power rests on that of their boss. Here we see what leadership by example does to people. As the leader is, so are his followers.

Third, THE UNREPENTED CRIMINAL. His case is especially sad. He was tied to the cross – totally powerless. Yet, at the moment when salvation was within grasp, he turned against Jesus saying: "Are you not he Messiah? Save yourself and us." Why? Because he was not ready to put his salvation in the hands of a Man who would not save himself. In our desire to control our own destiny, do we not behave as if our salvation is entirely in our own hands?

For his part, Jesus refused to use power for himself, not even to save himself. Rather, he appealed to be better nature of people to do what is right. Though powerful he performed miracles during his public ministry or he could have called on his Father's legions during his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane. Jesus used powerlessness as symbolized by the cross to win and save humankind. Or if Jesus used power at all, it was to give life, not to take it away.

This last is especially true in the way Jesus dealt with the good thief who was being crucified with him. Rebuking his fellow criminal, the good thief turned to Jesus saying: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus, acting as Savior even at the moment of his life, told him: "Today you will be with me in Paradise."

Jesus as Savior does not think of his own skin as he works for the salvation of others for whose sake he came in the first place. That was what Jesus did with the penitent thief. And in forgiving the thief, Jesus did not inquire about his sinful past. He was only concerned about his future. How different is Jesus' way for forgiving compared to ours. First, we make those who have offended us deserve our forgiveness before we forgive them. If we can only go beyond our hurts, disregard our cynicism and future blessings – as Jesus did with the good thief – then we are not far from the Kingdom of God.

Because of our state of life or position in the community, say as parents or community leaders, we are entrusted with some power. How are we to use it? We can turn it into a channel of God's loving care for people. How? By bringing about happier families filled with understanding, respect, and readiness to serve and to forgive, by bringing about more peaceful and just communities.


This way, power or authority becomes service. Our readiness to really serve others and in the process save ourselves is what makes us kings with Jesus. This is what it means to derive power from the cross.

THE TRUE KINGSHIP OF JESUS CHRIST

What kind of King is Jesus? How do you envision Him? Remembering that they were promised a king from the line of David, the Israelites hoped for a Messiah who would set their political problems aright and bring about a worldly kingdom of Judaic power. Even Psalm 122 seems to describe this type of ruler.

Luke's Gospel today shreds that image after the whip of the Roman soldiers tore at Jesus' flesh. Still, the Romans flaunted the traditional notion with their ironic inscription above King Jesus' crown of thorns. Soldiers and ordinary people jeered the royal title at Him, yet the throne of Jesus was the cross of Christ from which He dispensed kingly mercy and justice toward the humble criminal who shared His execution.

Writing to the Colossians, Saint Paul describes the truth about Jesus and His kingship, using words like fullness, peace, and forgiveness. So let us go rejoicing!



The season of ADVENT begins next Sunday and resets the clocks and calendars of Christian worship. It summons us to the beginning. Advent is both a beginning and an end, an alpha and an omega of the Church's Year of Grace.

Advent is the time to pause, remember and celebrate that we are a people who wait. As watch-keepers for the dawn, as a woman with child, as Israel for the Messiah, Christians await the coming of Jesus in glory, in the fullness of time. This festival of the Winter Solstice, this "feast of Christ" does more than lead us form one year to another. In the power of Christ, Advent and Christmastime lead us from time to eternity. **Come, Lord Jesus!**

- 1. All Mass requests must be submitted *in writing* in order to save time and avoid mistakes. Mass intensions will *not* be taken over the phone or after Mass. *Send* or *drop them off* to us *in writing*.
- 2. Only four Masses per year may be scheduled by any one person. Only one of these may be scheduled on a weekend or holy day of obligation.
- 3. No Mass intentions will be taken for Easter weekend, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas.
- 4. If there are any Mass intentions for your loved ones here (from funerals), we already scheduled a Mass on or near the anniversary date of death.
- 5. Masses must be paid for at the time of scheduleing. According to Diocesan guidelines, the offering for each Mass is a minimum of \$10.
- 6. Please remember that Mass Intentions are a *request*. We reserve the right to make changes to the Mass schedule if need be due to circumstances beyond our control such as retreats, illness, etc. In this case, the next available date will be scheduled. Please note: we don't always have time to call you when a Mass needs to be rescheduled please refer to the bulletin.

Please note: Church Law requires the pastor to offer one of the Mass intentions each weekend (Saturday Vigil or Sunday) and each Holy Day of Obligation for "All the people entrusted to his care." In 2023, the Pro Populo Mass (All Living & Deceased Parishioners) will alternate between worship sites each weekend.


