Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass ©2001, 1998, 1970 CCD

Fr. Marlon's Reflections - First Sunday of Advent (Is. 2:1-5, Rom 13:11-14, Mt. 24:37-44)





With the start of Advent we begin to relive the period of waiting for the coming of our Savior – the birth of Jesus on the first Christmas day. But actually, the Lord comes to us in three ways.

The first coming of Jesus had already taken place when the Word made Flesh. He then came as our Savior. This was the event long awaited for by the Jews of the Old Testament. During Advent, we relive in our lives their experience of waiting for the Lord's coming as our way of preparing for the anniversary of his birth. Like them, we long for the day when the Prince of Peace would so change people's heart that as we have seen in the first reading: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation shall not raise

the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again." (Is 2:1-5)

The second coming is the return of Jesus in the end time. Jesus who is now seated at the right hand of the Father will come again but this time as Judge of both the living and the dead.

The third coming is situated between the first two comings. It is Jesus' coming into our hearts here and now to become our personal Savior. This is our immediate and primary concern here and now. And this can happen only if we freely allow Jesus to act within us.

The gospel reading talks about the second and final coming of Jesus. This was then a burning issue among the early Christians. Being persecuted, they expected to be delivered from it with the return of Jesus. His response to this: "But of that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but the Father alone." For this reason, Jesus urged them to be watchful and vigilant: "Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." To be watchful and vigilant means to throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light and to conduct ourselves properly as in the day.

The first is the story about what happened to the people in the time of Noah when the Great Flood wiped away sinful humanity. They were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage. This was not unusual and there was nothing wrong with it. What they did wrong was in not living up to their call as children of the Covenant which God entered into with them beginning with their father Abraham: they, to be his people and he, to be their God. But though God was always faithful to it, they were not. Instead, they did what was abominable in God's sight: they worshipped idols. Signs were sent to warn them against their infidelity but they ignored them. In desperation at their being so stiffnecked, God wiped them off the face of the earth with the Great Flood. Only Noah and his family who remained faithful to the Covenant were saved.

What people were doing before the Flood, people still do today. True, in our day, especially in this age of materialism and consumerism, we as a people no longer worship molten idols. But worship idols we still do – wealth, power and fame. We have so filled our mind and heart with our desire for them that we have no room there for anything else. We have been warned repeatedly against their evil deeds but we do not seem to listen. And Jesus, who has already come into the world and is only too willing to come into our heart, cannot make us do so, respecting as he does our freedom. Thus our situation now is no different than it was in Noah's time or in Jesus' words, "As it was in the days of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Son of Man.

Advent is a call to watchfulness and vigilance especially as regards the coming of Jesus into our hearts. Thus, Jesus' admonition, "So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

At Jesus' birth, except for a small remnant, most of the people during his time did not recognize him as the promised Savior. This was because their interests and attention were focused everywhere else except on God. Advent reminds us not to repeat the same mistake as it will have terrible repercussions on our lives. Rather, Advent invites us to be like the remnants of old who were always on the watch for the coming of the Savior and thus were ready to receive him when he came.

Today we light the first candle on our Advent wreath. It is the "Prophecy Candle" which announces the waiting period that anticipates Christmas and honors



those who first spoke the promise of the Christ Child. Their words sparked hope in the hearts of the faithful.

Stay awake! Be prepared! The Son of Man will come when you least expect. - Mt 24:37-44

Our new liturgical year begins today with the season of Advent - a time of hopeful expectation of the coming of the Lord. On the First Sunday of Advent, we look forward to the end of time when we will awaken to the dawn of Christ's new day. Today we hear Isaiah speak of a day when God's power will have brought universal peace and God's Word will have instructed all people, radiating God's light (teachings) into all of human society. Only when humanity walks in the light of the Lord, when all people desire to be instructed in God's ways will the world be set aright and our deepest longings fulfilled. Today's reading from Romans calls us to awake from sleep for this final day is at hand. Together this Sunday's scriptures proclaim our Christian faith that Jesus is the One who will finally come to fulfill God's plan of salvation. Come, Lord Jesus!

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Thursday, December 8, is the Feast of the **Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin** Mary. It is the patronal feast day of the United States of America and a Holy Day of Obligation.

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

- 1. All Mass requests must be submitted *in writing* in order to save time and avoid mistakes. Mass intensions will *not* be taken over the phone or after Mass. *Send* or *drop them off* to us *in writing*.
- 2. Only four Masses per year may be scheduled by any one person. Only one of these may be scheduled on a weekend or holy day of obligation.
- 3. No Mass intentions will be taken for Easter weekend, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas.
- If there are any Mass intentions for your loved 4. ones here (from funerals), we already scheduled a Mass on or near the anniversary date of death.
- 5. Masses must be paid for at the time of scheduleing. According to Diocesan guidelines, the offering for each Mass is a minimum of \$10.
- 6. Please remember that Mass Intentions are a request. We reserve the right to make changes to the Mass schedule if need be due to circumstances beyond our control such as retreats, illness, etc. In this case, the next available date will be scheduled. Please note: we don't always have time to call you when a Mass needs to be rescheduled - please refer to the bulletin.
