



Fr. Arnel's Reflections - First Sunday of Lent

Gen. 2:7-9; 3:1-7; Rom 5:12-19; Mt 4:1-11



Today is the First Sunday of Lent. Lent is a time of intense spiritual preparation for conquering our temptations, using the means Jesus taught us during His forty days of preparation in the desert for His public life. It is also the time for repenting of our sins and renewing our lives for the celebration of Easter with our Risen Lord who conquered sin and death by His suffering, death and Resurrection. Our readings for this Sunday teach us that we are always tempted by the devil, by the world, and by our own selfish interests. So, we need to cooperate actively with God's grace to conquer our temptations and practice prayer, self-control, and charity.

The First Reading which is taken from the book of Genesis describes the "Original Temptation" – "*You will be like gods, knowing what is good and what is evil.*" Adam and Eve were given the possibility of making a choice to live for God, dependent upon and obedient to His will, or to say no to God. The temptation to evil led Adam and Eve to an act of faithlessness and sin. In contrast, today's Gospel from Saint Matthew shows us how Jesus Christ conquered temptation by relying on Faith in God's Word and authority.

The Responsorial Psalm (51:3-17) is the great "Miserere," a Prayer of Repentance patterned on the sorrow of King David and a prayer we should all be familiar with as an Act of Contrition.

In the Second Reading, Saint Paul describes how the disobedience of Adam, who fell to Satan's Original Temptation, brought him and us sin, death, and a broken relationship with God. Saint Paul explains that Christ regained for us a right relationship with God by his perfect obedience to God his Father.

Our Gospel teaches us how the "desert experience" of fasting, praying, and soul-strengthening enabled Jesus to confront His temptations successfully and then to preach the Good News of salvation. The tempter urges Jesus to turn stones into loaves of bread. But Jesus rejects that temptation to mistrust His Father by satisfying His own immediate, temporal needs — thus reducing His Divine mission to self-satisfaction! The tempter then suggests that Jesus prove that he is really the Son of God by jumping off the parapet of the Temple. Jesus rejects this as a temptation to act as God's superior and demand He prove His Trustworthiness! Finally, Jesus rejects the temptation to idolatry, even if worshipping Satan would enrich and empower Jesus with all kingdoms of the world.

On this First Sunday of Lent, we are challenged to do certain things. First, we are to confront and conquer temptations as Jesus did, using the means He used. Every one of us is tempted to seek sinful pleasures, easy wealth, and a position of authority, power, and glory, and to use any means, even unjust or sinful ones, to gain these things. Jesus serves as a model for us in conquering temptations by strengthening Himself through prayer, penance, and the effective use of the Word of God. Hence, during this Lent, let us confront our evil tendencies with prayer (especially by participating in the Holy Mass), and with penance or Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Second, we are to grow in holiness during Lent by prayer, reconciliation, and sharing. How? a) by finding time to be with God every day of Lent, speaking to Him in fervent prayer and listening to Him through the meditative reading of the Bible; b) by penitential acts; c) by getting reconciled with God through the Sacrament of Reconciliation and reconciled with others by asking their forgiveness for our offenses against them; d) by sharing our love with others through selfless and humble service, almsgiving, and helping those in need.

Finally, we should remember that we serve a loving and forgiving God. We give our best in resisting temptation, but remember at the same time that God knows our strengths and weaknesses. God loves us despite our failings and wants to be in relationship with us from now and into eternity. Worship, learn, repent, receive forgiveness and live out your life as a person of God.

WHO WE ARE AND WHOSE WE ARE

The Lenten season is a fresh invitation to explore again who God is, who we are, and what it means to be human. We begin by hearing the tragic story of the first humans in the book of Genesis. As Saint Paul describes in Romans, our struggles started when our ancestors broke the bond of unity with God, sought self-sufficiency, and grew apart from their true purpose and identity.

In Saint Matthew’s Gospel, we see how Jesus resists the lure of living outside of unity with God. He rejects false promises of possessions, power, and status and instead, puts His life in His Father’s hands.

As our model for living as a fully human person, Jesus demonstrates that we are created to live in relationship with and trust in God, and in harmony with and for all of creation.

Monday is the Feast of Saint Gregory of Narek,

an Armenian mystical and lyrical poet, abbot and theologian. He is venerated as a saint in the Armenian Apostolic and Catholic Churches and was declared a

Doctor of the Church by Pope Francis in 2015.

He is best known for his *Book of Lamentations*, a major work of mystical literature.

Friday is the Feast of Saint Katharine Drexel,

a Philadelphia heiress and foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. The second American born Saint, she began her postulancy at the Sisters of Mercy in Pittsburgh, established some forty-nine foundations, including Xavier University in New Orleans and is patron of racial justice and philanthropists.

Saturday is the Feast of Saint Casimir,

a Polish prince known as the brother and defender of the poor, who led an austere life. He is patron of all youth.

🎵 Music and the Silence of Lent

As we enter into the Season of Lent, you will notice some differences in the music at Mass and other devotions. First, the usual Prelude is omitted. This is because the norms for Lent permit the organ to be used to support the singing only; therefore, solo playing is suspended. An exception can be made on the Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday), when we mark the mid-point of Lent. The *Gloria* is also suspended during Lent. Other than on Solemnities, such as the Annunciation (March 25) the *Gloria* is next sung on Holy Thursday at the Mass of the Lord’s Supper. The *Alleluia* before the Gospel is replaced with an acclamation such as “Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!” We will also use a simpler Mass setting, the *Mass of Wisdom*, with the Mystery of Faith, *Savior us, Savior of the world*, to differentiate the solemnity of Lent. You may also notice that this year, we will not have music at Stations of the Cross, with the exception of two occasions (one at each site) when the music ministry team is leading the Stations. This, again, is to accentuate the silence of the season, helping us to enter the desert experience with Christ.

Question of the Week

When does my self-centeredness lead me to give in to temptation? How can my Christian concern for others help me to resist that temptation?

The Holy Spirit gathers us together today as we begin this forty-day season of Lent.

Life is full of temptations, and we are especially aware of them during Lent. We are tempted to do things we find desirable, even when we know they’re wrong. We are tempted to avoid things that are undesirable, even when we know they’re the right thing to do. Today we hear the serpent successfully tempt Adam and Eve and the devil unsuccessfully tempt Jesus. May the Holy Spirit, who accompanied Jesus in the desert and accompanies us wherever we go, give us the strength to resist temptation.
