

#### FR. MARLON'S INVITATION TO EXPERIENCE THE SACRED TRIDUUM

I would like to ask a very serious favor from all of you, beloved parishioners of St. Francis of Assisi. Please help me invite those in our parish community who in the past have not taken part in the liturgy of Holy Week or have not attended the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night. Let us invite them to join in on the celebrations this year and see how the experience might impact their spiritual life and their faith journey in Catholicism.

We know that the Sacred Triduum is a remembrance of Christ's passion and death; and a celebration of His Glorious Resurrection. It has been called the "greatest love story ever told" because God thought we were worth dying for. Why is it so important to attend each celebration of the Sacred Triduum? Below is a brief explanation on the importance of every celebration.

HOLY THURSDAY (6:00 pm at both worship sites) — At the Last Supper, Jesus gave us the words and rituals of the Eucharist, saying, "Do this in memory of me." The Eucharist is the center stage during the Holy Thursday liturgy, situated between the rituals of washing of one another's feet and adoring the Blessed Sacrament. As Catholics we attend Holy Thursday liturgy not only because Jesus asked us to remember Him in the Eucharist, but because Communion means "we do not come to Christ alone but with and through one another." Please make it your priority to attend the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and together we can recall that we also belong to a parish family. Leave time afterward to spend a few minutes before the Blessed Sacrament and in making the night one of remembering in your own home—remember the dearly departed in your family; remember the trials and the joys that you and your family have shared together and how they have made you hopefully stronger as a family.

GOOD FRIDAY (3:00 pm at both worship sites) — The cross that Jesus bears is a tool of torture and scandal that the Roman government reserved for lowest of criminals of the day—it was the electric chair of His times. By its use a slow and public death occurs and the Roman authorities made an example to others. At Golgatha the soldiers stripped and crucified Him but before breathing His last breath, Jesus says, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do," and according to John's Gospel, "It is accomplished."

But what Christ did upon that cross—His act of immense forgiveness—is twofold: first, he forgave our debt to God; second, He provides us with an example of how we are to respond to each other every day: "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." What can we learn from this to help our families? We know the need for forgiveness in our homes. It is hard to live in one house in harmony. If one person, a spouse, snaps at another a chain reaction of hurtful comments begins. A sibling in a rage of impatience with another hurls a biting comment. Far too often we "know what we are doing." Christ gives us an example of Love—forgiveness is the answer—granting it, asking for it—even when the offender isn't sorry. This is mercy. Without mercy, sin grows all the more; with it, grace abounds, as St. Paul says.

EASTER VIGIL (8:30pm in Masontown church) - It is considered the crown jewel in the Church's liturgy. We enter into our church in darkness, with the Paschal Candle as the only light—and from that singular candle hundreds of other smaller candles are lit until the Christ light illumines us all. The history of the world comes to light in the Exsultet, sung only this night, followed by the readings which highlight the history of our faith. We renew our baptismal promises and celebrate the Eucharist in joyful communion with one another — combining music and song, light and darkness, hope and joy—the Resurrection of life everlasting.

For us and our families, this means that sin does not have the final word. "That no sacrifice made for our family, done out of love, is wasted. Our flawed attempts to do the right things are redeemed; our pettiness, or pride can be forgiven if we but recognize them for what they are and repent." God never gives up on anyone—and neither should we in our respective family.

Don't give up. God doesn't. Easter means that sorrow is now joy, suffering is victory, and the sting of death is transformed into everlasting life—all this if we surrender ourselves to God's love and providence. Join us this Holy Week and reawaken, renew and recommit ourselves to the Lord.

Please bring A FRIEND when you come to the celebration of the Sacred Triduum. A most Blessed and Sacred Triduum and Easter Season to you and your family.



Today we enter into the most sacred week of the year. There is no other time, no series of feasts, that begins to compare with these next few days. There was a time when our entire schedule changed for this week, when the world slowed down (and actually stopped on Good Friday) and we could enter these mysteries in deep prayer and reflection. Today the world does not stop, nor do we have the luxury of vacation and so **we must make the time**, take the initiative and avail ourselves of every opportunity to center in upon the events the suffering, passion, death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

#### HOLY THURSDAY

Before the feast of Passover, Jesus celebrates the Last Supper in which He gives us His Body and Blood.

The **Chrism Mass** is celebrated this day at 10:00 am in Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Greensburg. During this Mass, Bishop Kulick will bless the Sacred Oils used in the Sacraments: the **Oil of Salvation** for Baptism; the **Oil of Chrism** for Baptism, Confirmation and Ordination; and the **Oil of the Sick**. All are welcome. Parking at the Cathedral is limited.

You may park at Our Lady of Grace Parish where a shuttle will be available to drive you to the Cathedral.

At Saint Francis of Assisi, the solemn Mass of the Lord's Supper will be celebrated at 6:00 pm at both worship sites. This Mass calls to mind the Last Supper, the First Mass and the Institution of the Holy Priesthood.

#### **GOOD FRIDAY**

The traditional Three Hours that Jesus hung upon the cross (Noon/3:00 pm) should be kept in quiet prayer. The **Good Friday Liturgy** will be celebrated at **3:00 pm** at both worship sites and will consist of: Liturgy of the Word (Readings); Veneration of the Cross and Reception of Holy Communion consecrated the night before.

For all Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59, Good Friday is a day of Fast and Abstinence. Fasting requires limiting oneself to one full meal,

with light nourishment taken on two other occasions (no eating between meals). This fast is minimal; if your health permits, you might wish to consider a more intense fast. Abstinence - all Catholics, age 14 and over, are bound to abstain totally from meat on Good Friday.

#### **HOLY SATURDAY**

The beautiful tradition of blessing Easter food baskets takes place at **11:00 am in Masontown and 12:00 in Footedale.** Following the blessing in Footedale, there will be an **Easter Egg Hunt** in the parking lot.

The most important, most beautiful liturgy of the entire Church year is found in the Easter Vigil which takes place in Masontown beginning at 8:30 pm.

In the early hours of the final night of our Easter journey, we pause to keep watch. A fire begins to flicker, the Easter Candle is lit from the new fire, carried prominently into the midst of the assembly and we begin to tell the story of who we have been and are becoming.

The Easter Vigil is comparable to sitting around a campfire listening to the stories of generations past.

Easter water is blessed, bells ring out, *Alleluias* and *Glorias* are sung for the first time in six weeks. It is the night of all nights, the heart of Christianity. It is Easter!



**The Paschal Candle** is a symbol of the risen body of Christ and the fire of the Spirit. It is decorated with a cross *(Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end);* the Greek Alpha and Omega; and the numbers of the current year *(All time belongs to Him and all the ages to Him be glory and power through every age forever).* Four grains of incense, sealed with red wax nails, are inserted at the ends of the

crossbars and one is inserted where the crossbars meet (By His holy and glorious wounds, may Christ our Lord guard us and keep us. Amen.) The candle remains lit throughout the fifty days of Easter and is extinguished on Pentecost. It is then used for its resurrection symbolism at baptism and funerals.

#### ENCOUNTER WITH THE CROSS

The journey of Lent brings us to an encounter with the cross. During Lent, we have been led more deeply into questions at the heart of our faith: Who is God? ... and ... who are we, the Church?

The Gospel of Matthew indicates that, in the crucifixion, God's true nature is most fully revealed in Jesus. In Jesus, God is the self-emptying One, who embraces humility and suffers rejection, as Paul tells the Philippians. God's power is redefined, present not in coercion and violence, but in Jesus' unbounded love.

We, the Church, can learn who we are - the followers of the Crucified One - when we bear crosses that offer life and hope to the world. We more fully become "the Church" when we empty ourselves by sharing in others' sufferings, rejecting violence, and taking risks for justice and reconciliation. Like Jesus we may reveal God's power as compassion and mercy.

We should glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, in whom is our salvation, life and resurrection; through whom we are saved and delivered. - Entrance Antiphon, Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper

Humbling Himself out of love for us, Jesus did not shield His face from buffets and spitting, but offered His life on the cross. He relied on His Father's love.

We greet the Lord today with palm branches and hosannas, welcoming Him to the holy city of Jerusalem. His missionary journey and our Lenten journey are nearing their completion. Soon Jesus will celebrate the Passover with His closest disciples here in the center of the Jewish world. Before the sun rises, He will be betrayed by one of His friends, arrested and taken away. He will be tortured, put on trial and sentenced to death. He will die on the cross, be taken down and be buried. From there He will be raised and will ascend to the holy city that is our eternal home. Today, as we shout our hosannas and wave our palm branches to welcome our Lord into Jerusalem, we look forward to the day when we will all be welcomed into the new Jerusalem.

The Blessing of Palm, the tree branches used to greet Jesus, takes place at each Mass today.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem is to be celebrated as a manifestation of the coming of the kingdom of God. It is this celebration of Palm Sunday that the Church's liturgy solemnly opens Holy Week. (CCC 560)
