

Fr. Arnel's Reflections - Fourth Sunday of Easter Acts 2:14a, 36-41; Ps 23: 1-3a, 3b4, 5, 6; 1 Pt 2:20b-25; Jn 10:1-10

ALLELUIA!

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Easter and it is called as Good Shepherd Sunday, and, appropriately, this day is also the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Today, the Church calls us to reflect on the meaning of God's call for each of us and to pray for generous respondents God's personal call (vocation), to the priesthood, the diaconate, and the consecrated life, because the entire Christian community shares the responsibility for fostering vocations. Both the Old and New Testaments use the image of a Shepherd and His flock to describe the unique relationship of God with Israel and Christ with Christians.

In the First Reading which is from the Acts of the Apostles, Saint Peter, now inspired by the Holy Spirit and renewed by the forgiveness of Christ, stands before a crowd and explains the meaning of what they have done in crucifying their Messiah and what must now be done to gain forgiveness. That basic truth has not changed – even in our modern technology age now, that is - Forgiveness is available "to all those whomever the Lord our God will call." Saint Peter then proclaims that the proper response to the Good News about Jesus is to repent and be baptized "in the name of Jesus Christ," and thus to become members of the flock of the Good Shepherd. Through the Sacrament of Baptism, they will receive forgiveness for their sins.

The Responsorial Psalm is the familiar Psalm that we call The Lord is My Shepherd from its opening line. Now you might be wondering "why is this here, what has it got to do with the Resurrection?" Have you ever wondered why God did not get angry with the Jews or the Romans who put Jesus to death? He could have slaughtered them all with one strike, but He did not. It is because that is not God's way. He leads them rather than forces them, and He will lead us if we follow His voice as He tells us in the Gospel Reading.

The Second Reading which is from the First Letter of Saint Peter might be a confirmation of the use of the Psalm 23. Saint Peter encourages the suffering Christians to follow in the footsteps of their shepherd ("the suffering servant"), and to remember that they have been claimed by Him. Saint Peter also explains how Jesus, the innocent sufferer, was a model of patience and trust in God, and he reminds us that it is the suffering of Jesus which has enabled us to become more fully children of God. Indeed, Jesus was divinely patient when suffering for the love of all mankind to be the instrument of salvation. This was His purpose and mission; and He fulfilled it in the manner He would like us to do when we are hit with suffering of any kind because, when we offer our sufferings to God in the form of patience, it is accepted as grace.

In the Gospel Reading which is taken from the Gospel of John, it appears to be a strange reading within the Easter Time but it in fact follows along with the theme of the Psalm 23. The two brief parables about sheep reveal Jesus as our unique means to salvation. He is the selfless, caring "shepherd" who provides protection and life itself, and He is the "sheep gate," the one gateway to eternal life. Jesus is simply telling us that He is the sheep-gate and if we are to enter heaven, we must enter through Him. For those who are not aware, shepherds would corral their sheep at night for protection and they would station themselves in the gateway to prevent wolves or thieves from entering. Thus, the shepherd would put himself at risk to protect his sheep. This is an act of love of the highest kind. We are being asked to look upon Jesus as our Divine Shepherd and to follow Him is to be led to eternal life.

So, the wonders of the Easter event continue, as they should, and we should remind ourselves daily that the Divine Shepherd is calling us to be His disciple, follower or servant. And we need to become good sheep in the fold of Jesus, the Good Shepherd. Finally, we need to pray for good pastors and vocations. We encourage those who are being called by God to the ministerial priesthood, the diaconate and the consecrated life to make a prayerful positive response. All Christians need to share in the responsibility of fostering these vocations by continuously praying for vocations both in the Church and in their families.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION


A major event happened in the life of these six children last Saturday. They received the Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ for the first time in the Holy Eucharist.




The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. - John 10:11-18

Today is called Good Shepherd Sunday because the gospel readings for the Fourth Sunday of Easter, always from John, deal with shepherds and sheep.

Because Jesus knows God as a loving and merciful Father, He shows us the way through the darkness. He is the good shepherd who looks after the needs of His flock rather than His own interests. He protects us from harm at the cost of His own life. Jesus not only tends our flock, He looks after all God's children, even when we don't recognize them as our brothers and sisters.

One day, we will stand face to face in a world without fences and will be surprised to see how much we resemble each other. Until then, we cannot let the darkness of the world blind us. With Christ to guide us, we dwell as one flock with one shepherd who leads us safely home. As sheep willingly follow their own shepherd, whose voice they recognize and who calls them by name, we willingly follow the Lord Jesus, for we know His voice and He calls us each by name. Gathered together on this Good Shepherd Sunday, let us pray that we may become more attuned to His voice so that we may more effectively continue His mission in the world.


