



# Fr. Arnel's Reflections - 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 Kgs 4:8-11, 14-16a; Ps 89:2-3, 16-17, 18-19; Rom 6:3-4, 8-11; Mt 10:37-42



On this 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time, the *First Reading* and the *Gospel* are talking about receiving the "holy men" who serve as God's representatives. In the Scripture, a "holy man" refers to someone who has the mission and responsibility as the bearer of God's word. In our time today, the men of our ministerial priesthood fulfill that role.

In the *First Reading*, a woman generously receives God's prophet Elisha into her home because she tells her husband, "I know that he is a holy man of God." Not only does Elisha's presence in her home enrich her life, but Elisha rewards her generosity by his petition to the Lord to bless his barren benefactress with a child.

In the *Responsorial Psalm*, the psalmist proclaims God's steadfast covenant love for His people and His faithfulness to the promises He makes to them. He describes God's protection of His people and their king, who is God's chosen representative to the covenant people. Chief among the kings of Israel was David, the divinely anointed shepherd-king with whom God made an eternal covenant. In Jesus of Nazareth, Son of God and Son of David, God fulfills the promises of the everlasting Davidic covenant. The resurrected Jesus Christ is the eternal King of God's New Covenant people.

In the *Second Reading*, Saint Paul, tells us how Christians receive an infusion of divine grace through the Sacrament of Baptism. The regenerative waters of baptism yield a supernatural transformation and rebirth. Baptism not only frees us from slavery to sin but allows us to begin a new life in which we are no longer a child of Adam but become a child of God. This "new life" is not merely symbolic. Saint Paul writes that in Christian Baptism, our old self dies with the crucified Christ, and in our new life, God calls us to live not only in freedom from "sin" but freedom from "self." The sinner is immersed in water and is thus "buried" with Christ with whom the Christian is also raised up through the water to a resurrection as a new creation, infused with "divine life" as a member of God's holy covenant family.

In the *Gospel*, Jesus gives a teaching on the conditions of discipleship. Jesus, the Living Word of God to humanity, warns that the decision to follow Him may cause a break in the bonds of our friendships and families. Alluding to His future crucifixion, Jesus invites His disciples to follow Him in announcing the Kingdom in His healing ministry, in His suffering, and ultimately in His glory. Jesus also speaks of the reward for receiving one of His emissaries and the Gospel message he carries. Jesus promises that someone who does even a small act of kindness for one of His disciples will not lose his reward of eternal life.

Finally, our readings today challenge us to be hospitable and generous. Hospitality means acknowledging the presence of God in others and serving Him in them, especially those in whom we least expect to find Him. We, as individuals and as a community, are to look for opportunities to be hospitable – and, of course, there are plenty of ways of offering hospitality. Maybe hospitality is offered through a kind word to a stranger – or even a smile. A kind smile or a "hello" to someone waiting with us in a grocery line may be the only kindness that person encounters all day. We become fully alive as Christians through the generous giving of ourselves. What is more important than the sending of checks for charitable causes is the giving of ourselves to people, primarily in the way we think about them, for from that spring will flow the ways we speak to them and about them, forgive their failings, encourage them, show them respect, console them, and offer them help. Such generosity reflects warmth radiating from the very love of God.


Jesus makes some uncomfortable statements in today's Gospel: We must love nothing - even our children - more than we love Him and we must lose our lives for His sake. In the face of this declaration, it's natural to ask: If this is the path, why am I on it? Paul says that the answer is nothing less than complete "newness of life."

Absorbed through baptism into Christ's death, we now share in His resurrection. A "newness" is what Jesus is asking for, a reorientation in what we have been taught to value. Nothing in our lives, now or to come, offers us the promise that Jesus does.

Ask yourself, why am I Christian? Seen through the lens of my Christian identity, what things do I value that I shouldn't? Pray each night this week for someone, living or dead, who has given their lives to service of the Gospel. Support a Catholic mission with prayer, time, or a donation. If you have children, involve them in these efforts.

Our relationship with Christ is the ultimate starting point - the wellspring. Every good quality in our character, every kind action of our lives, every devout practice of our day must flow from this place where we encounter Him in our hearts.


