"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." - Mt 16:24b-25

Father Anthony's Reflections 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A) - Jer 20:7-9; Rom 12:1-2; Mt 16:21-27

In today's Gospel, Jesus reprimanded Peter for going against God's will with his own intentions. Peter seemed not to fully grasp the significance of his declaration about Jesus as the Son of God, as recounted in last Sunday's Gospel. Jesus then proceeded to teach them about the balance between earthly life and eternal life, emphasizing that the former should serve the latter.

Jeremiah, in the First Reading, came to this realization. God assured Jeremiah of His support if he followed His Word. Jeremiah

had hesitations, but he felt a fervent conviction in his heart and an overwhelming urge to share it. He couldn't suppress it; he had to communicate it. Despite doing so, he faced considerable suffering, even receiving death threats. He questioned where God was and whether he had been deceived. Amidst feeling isolated and pursued, he was afraid, facing the consequences of his obedience to God.

St. Paul, in the Second Reading, encountered a similar fate. Upon his conversion, he devoted his life as an offering pleasing to God. He advised us to discern wisely and not conform blindly to the world's demands. Our lives should be guided by God's influence, giving up everything to Him. This isn't selfishness on God's part but rather the path to our salvation.

This underscores the importance of our standards. Jesus highlighted Peter's standards and quickly brought them to light. While we reside in this world, we don't fully belong to it. We're travelers on a journey to eternal life, tasked with proclaiming the Good News in this world. Like Jesus, we're called to infuse Christ's essence into the world. Through our actions, we embody His teachings, embracing God's standards in all our words and deeds.

Suffering, in essence, doesn't conclude within itself; it serves as a route towards magnificence. Jesus assumed the entirety of human suffering, reshaping it into a source of life -affirming significance. This is why we openly exhibit the crucifix rather than turning away from it. As we endeavor to alleviate suffering using appropriate methods, we also aspire to perceive it through the lens of God's viewpoint, seeking its underlying significance. Observing a crucifix serves as a reminder that God doesn't perceive suffering as something to evade relentlessly. He understands how to extract positivity from suffering.

The Sacrament of Confirmation is received in the eighth grade; however, students must have completed the Seventh Grade Confirmation Preparation Class (Faith Formation or Catholic School) prior to being admitted to the Confirmation Class.

If this requirement is not met, the student will be placed in the first grade or seventh grade preparatory class before being admitted to the corresponding Sacramental Class.

Ever Thought About Becoming Catholic?

Since the Church's earliest days, there has always been a strong concern for those wanting to convert to Christianity. Conversion is a turning around of one's life. It is an abrupt life stop. We stop; take stock; change directions, and proceed. It is a process which takes time, formation, and ... above all, acceptance of God's grace.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is the process by which one becomes a member of our Catholic faith. The process not only teaches the Doctrine of the Church, but also explores its practices. The first step is the Period of Inquiry which is a time for searching, questioning, discussing and reflecting. No decision is required during this Period of Inquiry.

This Rite is designed for those who have never been baptized, those who have no church to call their own, Catholics who have been baptized but have not received Confirmation or Eucharist, those who would like to come into full communion with the church, Catholics who have strayed from their faith and would like to be reconnected. 
