Communion to the Homebound is provided on a regular basis. Call the Parish Office to be added to our list.


Sacrament of Baptism: By appointment. Prior to your baby's Baptism, you must be a registered, practicing member of this parish.

Peter approached Jesus and asked him, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times." - Mt 18:21-22

Thoughts from Father Anthony 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A (Mt. 18: 21-35)



A young woman was always dreaming, that Jesus was speaking to her. She went to her Pastor, and told him about it. The parish priest was skeptical. The young woman insisted. Just to test the woman, the parish priest proposed to her, to ask Jesus about his past sins. The woman agreed. She return to the church the following day. She saw the priest and told him that Jesus appeared again in her dreams. The priest said to her, "did you ask, Jesus about my previous sins? The young woman replied affirmatively. Then, the priest continued, "what were my past sins? The young woman answered, that Jesus said to her, "what I have forgiven, I have forgotten". When God forgives us, he forgets our sins.

What I observed in many of us now, as if your excited and interested to know, what are the sins of the priest. therefore If we forgive, let us forget and move on. The Gospel tells us, that God freely forgives us. He is always willing and ready to forgive. And God forgives, without limit, without condition, without any hesitation. This explained the number seven. Seven signifies fullness, completeness. It is a perfect number for the Jewish people. So, when Peter suggested to forgive a sinner seven times, he was thinking that he was fulfilling, more than the Law required, when it comes to forgiveness. But Jesus answered him, seventy-seven times, he was telling Peter to forgive to the utmost of his capacity to forgive. We must forgive without limit because God's forgiveness is without limit, without measure, and without end.

Jesus tells a story-a parable to illustrate the point. We must pay close attention, to every detail of the parable, if we are to fully appreciate the significance of Jesus' teaching. A king's servant owes his master "a huge amount" How huge? So huge that he has absolutely no way of paying the king back. The king is a figure of God. We owe God everything, and there's is nothing that we can offer that could ever repay God for all he has done for each and everyone of us. Similarly, when we sin against God, our offense is, beyond our ability to make up for it. The servant's insistence that he will pay everything back, is nothing but a desperate attempt to gain time. He knows he can never repay the debt. It is at this point, that the parable illustrates the unlimited mercy of God. He forgives not because we deserve forgiveness, but because He is God, who is love and mercy. However if we, having been the beneficiaries, of so great a mercy, let us forgive one another. Like all of God's gifts, his mercy and forgiveness, must be shared with others, if it is ever to be truly efficacious in my own life. Remember, It is only in the measure that we forgive others that God will forgive us.

Let us take a look on the first reading from the book of Sirach. Wrath and anger are hateful things yet sinner hugs them tight. The vengeful will suffer the Lord's vengeance, for he remembers theirs sins in detail. Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the Lord? Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself, can he seek pardon for his own sins? If one who is but flesh cherishes wrath, who will forgive his sins?

An unwillingness to forgive breeds anger, resentment, bitterness. They do not only infect the person but they also infect his relationships. All sin, but especially the bitterness and anger, that accompany a lack of forgiveness, hurt those around us. And so we need forgiveness, and we must forgive not only for our own sake, but also for those we love. The closer the relationship the more damaging the lack of forgiveness becomes. At each and every mass we pray in the words that our Lord Himself taught us, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." As we anticipate the moment of our reception of the Body and Blood of the Lord we say, "Lord I am not worthy..." How true! It is God who makes us worthy by forgiving our neighbor from our hearts. It is then by forgiving that we will experience true peace.

Remember our responsorial psalm today, "The Lord is kind and Merciful, slow to anger, and rich in compassion".



The Practice of Hope

Let us never make the grave mistake of assuming we earn our salvation in the same way we earn a wage. It is a gift lavished upon us by a God who does not count the hours of our labor or measure the amount of our output.

In today's readings, Peter is looking for a clear, bright line beyond which there is no hope of forgiveness. How much, he seems to be asking, are we to tolerate from our brothers and sisters before we can write them off? As humans, we are all drawn to such definite boundaries. What's more, we tend to weigh God's mercy using our finite capacity for forgiveness as a measure, but as Christians, we know that God's forgiveness is limitless and if we hope in the eternal forgiveness of God, we must also offer that forgiveness to others.

Tuesday is the Feast of Saint Januarius

Bishop of Benevento during the Diocletian persecutions, he went to visit two deacons and two laymen in prison and was himself imprisoned and martyred. His blood was collected and stored in two vials. As early as 1389, his blood has liquefied on this and other days each year.

Wednesday is the Feast of Saints Andrew Kim Tae-gon and Paul Chong Ha-sang and Companions Andrew, born in Seoul, was a convert to the faith and ordained as Korea's first native priest. In 1846, he was martyred along with his lay associate, seminarian Paul Chong Ha-sang. Between 1839 and 1867, 103 martyrs gave their lives for the faith in Korea.

Thursday is the Feast of Saint Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist. His Gospel was intended for a largely Jewish-Christian audience as it seeks to portray Christianity as consistent with the Jewish tradition and a continuation of it. Tradition holds that Matthew preached in Judea and Ethiopia where he was martyred. He is symbolized by the winged human being and is patron of accountants and customs officers.

Saturday is the Feast of Saint Pius of Pietrelcina

Saint John Paul II canonized Padre Pio of Pietrelcina on June 16, 2002. More than 300,000 people braved excessive heat to fill Saint Peter's Square and nearby streets for the ceremony. They heard the Holy Father praise the new saint for his prayer and charity and for

Padre Pio's witness to the power of suffering.

If accepted with love, the pope stressed, such suffering can lead to "a privileged path of sanctity."

There is meaning in the suffering in your own life.

Search for it with patience and faith.


Question of the Week: How do I see myself letting resentment or bitterness build up in my heart? Who do I need to reach out to and forgive?
