

Thoughts from Father Anthony



28th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A - (Mt. 22:1-10)

It is said that whenever opportunity knocks, instead of people getting off their feet to open the door, they complain about the noise. Life becomes a case of whatcould have-been simply because we did not take seriously those moments of opportunities. Life is full of opportunities, but they are not always there forever. Either we seize them while we have the time and ability, or we reject them. If we choose the former, it is a decision to accept what opportunities may bring into our lives. If we choose the latter, it means we are not willing to undergo the obstacles

relative in every opportunity. It is absolutely important to be sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit. If we pray sincerely and ask for the Spirit's guidance, He will lead us to the best decisions. The best decision may not be the easiest ones. Many times, they are the most difficult ones; however, the Holy Spirit gives us an unexplainable inner peace derived out of doing the right thing despite hardships.

To be worthy of the banquet of God's kingdom is not merely a matter of avoiding evil. Some of those invited to the wedding banquet were not necessarily evil people. They simply ignored the invitation either because they were not interested, or they were struck with what they thought were more important things. One went to his farm, and the other to his business. It seems unbelievable, but it does happen that we allow ourselves to lose much in order to gain so little and sometimes we never learn. We keep on pursuing worldly things as if they are all there is to life only to neglect the call of faith and involvement in God's kingdom. We work towards self-sufficiency in order to declare ourselves autonomous individuals, free from God's authority.

Here in today's Gospel there are three types of rejection of God's invitation. First are those who ignored the invitation and went away, one to his farm, another to his business. Second are those who laid off his servant, mistreated them, and killed them. Third are those who accepted the invitation of God but were not dressed in a wedding garment. Of course, there are others who do not only reject God's invitation but make a parody of God. They insult and even kill His messengers. They do not only spurn His authority but completely disregard the consequences of their actions. They fear neither God nor the last judgment of God.

We have to decide for ourselves if we want to avail ourselves of God's opportunities of grace because God respects our freedom. We have to work hard if we wish to possess the promise of everlasting life; however, condemnation is not a punishment but a consequence of our rejection to God's invitation.

We can see from today's first reading, final salvation was portrayed under the image of a banquet. "On this mountain the Lord of hosts will provide for all people a feast of rich food and choice wines, juicy, rich food and choice wines. The Lord will destroy death forever and wipe away every tear from face to face. Thus salvation entails a positive response to God's invitation. God wants all of us to be saved, He wants all of us to come to Him and experience His forgiving love. God invites us to unite ourselves to Him and enter into His friendship. God's invitation is given to all. God calls us regardless of our social position or social status. He calls us to come to Him regardless of our physical appearance or intellectual capacities; but how do we respond to His call? Now let us remember, once we answer, we have to adapt and align ourselves to His ways and His wishes. It is not enough to accept or to answer, we have to change our lifestyle, be contrite, and transform ourselves according to His plans for us. We have to participate faithfully. We have to act truthfully, we have to fulfill His will and His words completely and unconditionally. In doing so, we can exclaim "I shall live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life."

once we accept God's invitation into His kingdom (once we become Christians), we still have work to do. Like the underdressed guest, we can still be judged unfit for the banquet. Our limited view may get in our way.

The complacency Jesus warns us about is defeated with deepened faith. The domestic church is where faith is organically grown and nurtured; if you do not already have one, start a family faith tradition such as a weekly Rosary or nightly prayer together.

THE CONFESSIONAL is a familiar setting in literature and drama. Everyone from Doestoevsky and Shakespeare has used the sacrament to tragic or comic effect or to reveal aspects of character otherwise hidden. All of this has had a numbing effect on our own expectations, yet the artists are on to something. The reconciliation chapel is a place where hearts are laid bare, where honesty is the watchword, and people confess their deepest needs. It is also a place of rebirth, or at least realignment. It is, like the baptismal font, a place where something dies, and where something else is born. Today, although literature has barely caught up, the place is usually not the dark and gloomy cabinet of old; rather it is a chapel that speaks of peace, serenity, and the comfort of a welcome home. People in one parish were astonished recently to see their children skipping with delight as they left the place of their first confession. We have to wait a bit for world literature to catch up with this reality, but at least we can experience the joy of penance, the thrill of a new beginning, the assurance of God's love.




MISSION CO-OP APPEAL Each year the parishes of the Diocese of Greensburg are asked to support a particular mission with our prayers and financial support. This year we are asked to support the DIOCESE of SICUANI.

Bishop William G. Connare initiated the Diocese of Greensburg's support for Sicuani as its *Sister Diocese* in 1963 in response to the Vatican II call for dioceses in North America and Europe to send priests to Central and South America. The diocese sent priests to Sicuani until the 1980s and now supports the prelature with prayers and financial support.

Formed on January 10, 1959 by Saint Pope John XXIII, its first three bishops were from the United States and Canada. Sicuani is 2 1/2 hours south of the Inca city of Cusco in the Andes Mountains and consists of four of the poorest regions in Peru. The majority of the people are farmers descended from the Incas and are scattered throughout the mountainous terrain with few paved roads to facilitate travel. They mostly raise corn, potatoes, llamas, alpacas, sheep and cows. The population is 86% Catholic, but many are in areas that are so remote they are visited by a priest to celebrate Mass just once a year.

Lumen Gentium (Light to the Nations), one of the foundational documents of the Second Vatican Council, teaches us that, as Catholics, we are all missionaries. May you feel the gratitude of all the People of God in the Diocese of Sicuani for whatever you can share with God's precious poor. Special **Mission Cooperation Plan** envelopes are provided for your generous response.

The goodness and mercy of God are gifts that He wants to share with each one of us, but we have to be ready to receive them. Let's be prepared for whatever the Lord will ask of us this week.
