
Sacrament of Baptism: By appointment. Prior to your baby's Baptism, you must be a registered, practicing member of this parish.

Thoughts from Father Anthony





29th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A (Matthew 22:15-21)

Today's Gospel has two essential lessons for us. The first is about honesty. We must be true to our words. We must be honest in our actions. We must be transparent in our relationship when it comes to things and to people. Praises should not be used for one's advantage. Sweet words should not be spoken for one's personal benefits and interests. Everything must be based on honesty. Everything we say or do must be founded on goodwill and must be for God's greater glory. Jesus is always reminding us "Let your 'Yes' mean Yes and your 'No' mean No. Anything more is from the evil one."

The second lesson is against hypocrisy. Jesus asked them, "why are you testing me, you hypocrites?" Hypocrisy is pretension and deception. The opposite of hypocrisy is honesty and sincerity. We must give to God what belongs to Him. We must render to God what is due to Him, that is, our honest words and our sincere actions. Now the Gospel is telling us to worry less of trivial and petty things but pay more attention to God's words and will. We must put more emphasis on God rather than the acquisition of material things. God should be the first priority in our life. Our life comes from Him and we must return our life to God. Thus let us be eager to offer to God a pleasing, a penitent, and productive life.

To the question, "Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?," Jesus' reply was, "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." Excellent answer! Only Jesus can answer this way. Where was the trap? If Jesus said, "Pay your taxes," He would draw the fire of many Jews. They hated to pay taxes to the Roman Government. If He said, "No," He would be under fire from the Roman government. Jesus not only eluded the trap but taught them to be responsible citizens of government and God's Kingdom! Jesus pointed out to them that, through the coin which has the image of Caesar, they were able to transact business. Since Caesar's image was on those coins, all the services of those coins are the responsibility of Caesar. It was but fitting that taxes are collected for those services. This one was easy to understand and accept in spite of the excessive taxes exacted on them.

The main message was in the second part of Jesus' answer, "Repay to God what belongs to God." How can we repay God?" What is the relation between paying Caesar and paying God? Going back to Jesus' response, by asking for a coin which has the image of Caesar, we ask which or who has God's image? A true Jew, and I can also say, a true Christian should be able to answer it. The Book of Genesis has the answer. It is a basic teaching in the Christian Faith. "God created man in His image; in the divine image He created him; male and female He created them." In each and everyone of us is God's image. Thus, God owns us. We repay God's goodness with our whole person with time, talent, and treasure.

Caesar is a person. God's image is in him too; thus, he himself belongs to God. In the end, we are commanded to be responsible citizens. More importantly, we ought to be responsible creations of God! Therefore, Give the Lord Glory and Honor. Obey God by loving Him. Accordingly, "There is a deep connection between love and obedience because a person can only obey to the extent that he/she loves.

Saturday is the Feast of Saints Simon and Jude

In the Gospel of Luke, Simon is called a zealot, a person of strong beliefs and actions. In those days, there was a radical group among the Jews called the Zealots. These radicals hated the Romans for taking control of Israel and wanted to remove the invaders by force; however, in Simon's case, the word zealot may have meant that he took the Jewish law very seriously. According to legend, Simon the Zealot spread the gospel in Egypt.

In the gospels of Matthew and Mark, Jude is called Thaddeus. We call him Jude to distinguish him from Judas Iscariot, who betrayed Jesus. He is called the patron saint of hopeless cases.

This feast comes just before All Saints Day. There are old customs for today that are about getting ready for "Hallowmas." It was once a custom this day to go from door to door begging for the ingredients of "soul cakes," which were eaten in early November as a way to share a meal with the dead. People would sing, "For the love of Simon and Jude, give us fixings for our food!"

The Lord is king and there is no other.

We are to render to God, therefore, fitting praise and service, as is God's due. God's word to us, in turn, is a matter of power and strength, to be lived with conviction of heart.



The words from today's Gospel, "repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God," are a reminder of our struggle to integrate our lives as faithful citizens with our lives as faithful Catholics. We are obligated to do both: to bring our faith and values to all of our responsibilities, including our civic ones. May the Eucharist that we receive and share today strengthen us in fulfilling our mission in every respect.

What belongs to God? Christians believe that all things belong to God and that all we have is given to us by God. How, then, does the Christian live in a world of commercial and civic accountability? After all, the Church abides within the economic and political systems of a given time and place, to which it necessarily conforms much of the time, but it cannot serve two masters and it cannot deny its identity and mission. This means that Christian life is about seeking balance so that the Church will be what it should be: the light of the world.

The World Mission Rosary

Daily Prayer is the best way to make a real difference in the lives of children all over the world and the World Mission Rosary is an excellent way to pray for the missions. Each set of beads is a different color.

Yellow is for Asia, where the sun rises first each day.

Red is for the Americas, where missionaries journeyed, "on fire" with faith in Jesus. White is for Europe, home to the Pope, clothed in white. Blue is for the islands of the Pacific, surrounded by the ocean waters.

Green is for Africa, with its many trees and plants.
