Thoughts from Father Anthony

33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A (Matthew 25:14-30)

Accordingly successful people are never born; they are made. Success is no accident; it is a decision. Roger Bacon says that "buried seeds may grow but buried talents never." Thus, the man who buried the one talent that his master entrusted to him was condemned. He was either afraid or lazy to invest the money of his master. It was rendered useless because it was not used.

In the kingdom of God, uselessness is an invitation to disaster. The tasteless salt, the fruitless tree, the weeds, the inedible fish and yes, buried money and talents. They are either thrown out or cut down to be burned. What is even worse is that the worthless servant was stripped even of the little that he had and was thrown outside into the darkness. Indeed, if you have not been trustworthy in handling money, who could entrust you with true wealth? Those servants who were faithful and industrious were rewarded greater tasks. They were able to work according to the talents given them, and these earned interests for the master. Since they were willing to accept responsibilities, they were rewarded with even greater responsibilities by the master.

In no way does God's kingdom apply the utilitarian principle, but each one of us is expected to contribute with faithfulness in doing his respective assignment in this world. Usefulness means a decision to participate actively in building up God's kingdom through the wise use and development of our talents. According to commentary, it is not a person's talent which matters, what matters is how the person uses it. God never demands from a person abilities which the person does not have but He demands that a person should use to the fullest the abilities that a person does possess. People are not equal in talent but people can be equal in effort. The parable tells us that whatever talents we have, little or great, we must lay it at the service of God.

The writer Dennis Kimbro outlined four critical questions to ascertain our talents and abilities:

First: What is it that we love to do? We cannot do well what we hate to do. Somehow there is a particular activity or task that we never get tired of doing.

Second: What will we do for free? If we work on something without the thought of financial reward, we work as though we play. Some people identify this as a sense of fulfillment; others call this the sense of mission in life. We may describe this as a social responsibility; service is what we pay for the space we occupy in this world.

Third: What comes easy for us but is difficult for others? We may not be seven feet tall to dunk the ball into the basket like the NBA players but certainly, we have other qualities that we can develop and maximize.

Fourth: Ask the people who know us best. What can they see in us that we can do best? Well-meaning fellow humans can give us honest-to-goodness feedback on our potentials. Responsibility means to respond with ability.

Discover the abilities that God has endowed us with. Do not be afraid to respond to the call of service that He is inviting us to do. In proportion to our respective capacities and vocation, we are empowered by special graces to act accordingly and faithfully to our duties in this world.

In his Apostolic Letter, *Misericordia et Misera*,
Pope Francis designated the Thirty-third Sunday of
Ordinary Time "World Day of the Poor." He wrote:
"It will be a day that will help communities and each

lies at the door of our homes there can be no justice
or social peace. This day will represent a genuine form
of new evangelization which can renew the face of
