

Thoughts from Father Anthony





31st Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A (Mt. 22: 1-12)

When I was ordained a transitional deacon as other priests experienced, I was given the Bible with this instruction and prayer: "*Receive the gospel whose herald you are. Believe what you read, preach what you believe, and practice what you preach*" but you know on that night before I went to bed, I added for myself to those words: "*Pray what you practice.*"

Faith is not only belief, praxis, and prayer; but faith is a *relationship* of believing, practicing, praying, living, and sharing. A priest, in his homily, said that

it is primarily witnessing to a caring God for a searching people. It is in *reflecting* on the things we do and the things that happen to us. It is *finding* an everyday God with His message and plan for us in all our undertakings. In other words walk the talk.

In today's gospel, Jesus affirms the Pharisees and scribes as legitimate leaders of people, following Moses. He tells His disciples to obey and respect them but not to follow their example. What they say is true so follow them, but in practice they are misusing their authority for the sake of their selfish advantage, so do not imitate their example. Many people say that authority is bad. They say that power corrupts. Everyday we hear stories in the media about scandals among politicians, corporate heads, even in the church, and others who hold positions of authority, but authority is good because it comes from God.

God entrusts a share of His authority to men and women. It is the *abuse* of authority that makes authority a bad thing. Just money - money is good and is not the root of evil, but it becomes the root of evil when we begin to love it and make money as our gods. Authority is entrusted to us by God not to dominate and exploit others but for service. So leadership is service, leadership by example.


St. Paul in our second reading today tells us his description of service as a leader among the Thessalonians, that he was a caring and dedicated leader. He tells them that he worked day and night while preaching the gospel. He served selflessly. He was not trying to impress them or gain anything from them; thus, he was giving to people not simply human words but the word of God. St. Paul is truly a great example, putting into practice precisely what Jesus teaches today: *"The greatest among you must be your servant."*

There is a gap between our faith and action, theology and practice. There is a dichotomy in our Christian life. There is supposed to be none. What Christ stresses is that our concern should not be after titles of honor and worldly dignity, things which the scribes and Pharisees were craving. In other words, it is *service* that matters. If we want to become great human beings and outstanding Christians, then we must *serve* the rest. Our service might take the form of meeting physical and material needs like: washing or cooking meals for the family and many more. It is a small thing but taken for granted. In the eyes of God it is the greatest performance we ever have.

Our service might take the form of caring for the emotional and psychological needs of others like offering them companionship when they are down and friendship - speaking words of hope and encouragement, showing acceptance and giving recognition. It could be by visiting our sick and ill parents and taking good care of them. It could be your dedication as a parent by teaching your children in a right way through role model. It could be our ministry in the church as well. Another form of service might be to meet the spiritual and faith needs of others like giving good examples, living simple lifestyles and many more.

What is our feeling now when we hear Jesus criticizing the Pharisees? Are we happy? Are we satisfied or sad and sorrowful because, like the Pharisees, we are also hit by such criticism?





We come together today, as we do each Sunday, to praise and thank God and to celebrate the Eucharist as Jesus called us to do. We do all this in a spirit of humility, aware that all that we are and all that we have comes ultimately from God and that the Eucharist is Christ's own Body and Blood, which He offered to us so that we could have eternal life. Today's Gospel reminds us that it is proper to humble ourselves before the Lord, for we are called to serve, not to be served.

In the early part of the 20th century, a war called the Great War (World War I) involved most of the countries of the earth. Millions died as a result of new, terrible weapons. Everyone hoped that it was the war to end all wars. A very special time was chosen as the hour when the guns would be stilled and peace declared: *the eleventh* hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. By this choice, the signers of the peace treaty suggested that humankind waited until it was nearly too late. The day chosen for the beginning of peace was special for another reason - it was the memorial of Saint Martin of Tours who had been a soldier. His feast day, Martinmas, is a celebration of peace and Saint Martin of Tours is the patron saint of soldiers. On Veteran's Day, all Americans who have fought in wars - those who survived as well as those who died - are honored.

are ready to be scheduled. Please help us to serve you better by observing the following:



- 1. All Mass requests must be submitted *in writing* in order to save time and avoid mistakes. Mass intensions will *not* be taken over the phone or after Mass. *Send* or *drop them off* to us *in writing*.
- 2. Five Masses per year may be scheduled by any one person. Two of these may be scheduled on a weekend or holy day of obligation.
- 3. No Mass intentions will be taken for Easter weekend, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Thanks-giving Day and Christmas.
- 4. If there are any Mass intentions for your loved ones here (from funerals), we already scheduled a Mass on or near the anniversary date of death.
- 5. Masses must be paid for at the time of scheduleing. According to Diocesan guidelines, the offering for each Mass is a minimum of \$10.
- 6. Please remember that Mass Intentions are a *request*. We reserve the right to make changes to the Mass schedule if need be due to circumstances beyond our control such as retreats, illness, etc. In this case, the next available date will be scheduled. Please note: we don't always have time to call you when a Mass needs to be rescheduled - please refer to the bulletin.

Please note: Church Law requires the pastor to offer one of the Mass intentions each weekend (Saturday Vigil or Sunday) and each Holy Day of Obligation for "All the people entrusted to his care." In 2023, the

Pro Populo Mass (All Living & Deceased Parishioners) will alternate between worship sites each weekend.


