
Communion to the Homebound is provided on a regular basis. Call the Parish Office to be added to our list.

Thoughts from Father Anthony





Third Sunday of Advent - Year B (Jn. 1:6-8, 19-28)

It was Christmas time. Gifts were a-coming; a parish priest was waiting excitedly. Then one by one they came in, in different boxes with colorful wrappings and ribbons. A son of a bakery owner handed him a package, to which the priest said: "Ah, I know what's inside even without opening the box!" and smelling it, he said: "These are chocolate cakes." A gift from a meat shop owner was given and the priest said: "I know its contents," smelling again, he remarked: "These are my favorite homemade sausages." Then came a present from a wine store owner, and the priest said: "I'm sure I know again what is inside, it's wine!" He sniffed the box,

but he couldn't figure out the scent. It didn't smell like wine. So he shook it but couldn't hear bottles clanging. Then some fluid gushed out from the box and he tasted it ... again ... then again. It didn't taste like wine. Very much intrigued, he opened the package and, to his surprise, he found a puppy inside.

God sent us a gift this Christmas. We cannot presume to know its value unless we open our hearts to receive it with gratitude. Gift giving should not be converted into a game of guessing, but an occasion of appreciating. The gift within every gift is the opportunity to discover - not only the content, but the sacrifice of the giver. The gift of the Son was given to us by a loving Father. Such a priceless gift emanates from the resplendent love of both the Giver and the one Given. The Father gave a gift, not out of His surplus not excess of treasure and power, but of His very own. He has not sent something but someone, who is no less than His own beloved Son. In Christ He has given us the gift of Himself - Emmanuel, God is with us, "God's love for us was revealed," St. John declared, "when God sent into the world His only Son, so that we could have life through Him" (1 John 4:9). Let us then praise God for His precious gift for us.

The Third Sunday of Advent is called "Gaudete Sunday." "Gaudete" is the first word, in Latin, of today's Entrance Antiphon: "Gaudete in Domino semper" - "Rejoice in the Lord always." To remind people that they are preparing for the very joyful occasion of the birth of Jesus, the celebrant wears rose-colored vestments. The third candle in the advent wreath, a rose colored one was lighted.

Let us heed the call of the apostle Paul in the second reading: "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus." Isaiah in the first reading declares: "The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; He has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the LORD and a day of vindication by our God."

In today's Gospel, John the Baptist was being questioned of his identity. He humbly told them that he was not the Messiah that Israel was waiting for. He also denied that he was Elijah who had a reputation of appearing every now and then. Nor was he the Prophet, the one foretold by Moses. Then he revealed to them his mission by quoting Isaiah, the prophet: "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the way of the Lord."

The attitude of John in today's Gospel is a good strengthening act. He was humble. He was tempted to represent himself as the Messiah, or even Elijah and the Prophet. He could have gotten away with it for he was very popular. The Jews came to him for baptism of repentance but he knew who he really was and was humble enough to admit that his role was a precursor of Jesus. He admitted that he was not even worthy of tying Jesus' sandals and that it was Jesus who must increase and he must decrease. John humbly accepted his role and was more concerned about the fulfillment of the plan of God than his own fame. The humility of John is more of proclaiming and living the truth than degrading oneself or keeping a low profile. John truthfully responded to the questions thrown at him. He was tempted to lie and make false claims but he knew his role and who was the true Messiah. He was faithful to the truth. How about our humility? How about our truth? One glaring truth which we must improve on, is the truth that we are God's creatures and God is our Creator.

When we gain intelligence, riches, power, and fame, we tend to claim to be better than God or that we do not need God anymore. We fail and forget our true place before God. Even in our prayers, we tend to dictate on God. It is not His will anymore but our will that should happen. We boast that we know better and God seems ignorant, if not too slow and wrong. How dare we regard God like that?

This season of advent, as we await the Lord's coming, it is good to step back for a while, be silent, and reflect on how we have lived our lives in relation to God. John the Baptist is mentioned in the Gospel for two consecutive Sundays. His presence will continue to be mentioned even during Christmas day. It is a testimony of the importance of exercising humility during these times. It is but apt for the very reason for the season, Jesus Christ, is Truth, Humility personified!

This week, rejoice! Gather spiritual strength. Exercise humility. Look forward to satan's defeat and the Lord's coming in victory!

Lighting the Way for Joy

Halfway through this season of preparation, we celebrate Gaudete Sunday, this Sunday of joy and gladness. With eager anticipation we prepare our hearts for Christ as we prepare our homes for Christmas. Recalling that Mary and Joseph could not find a proper place for Mary to give birth to our Savior, we commit to preparing a proper place to receive our Lord anew into our lives. In Him. the blind see and the deaf hear, the poor are fed and the dead are raised. May we ready ourselves to see the wonders the Lord can do in our midst.



Today we light the third candle on our Advent wreath. It is the "Shepherd's Candle" which symbolizes Joy and honors those who were the first to share the Good News in word and song as we celebrate around our star-topped Christmas tree.



Advent resounds with the theme of RECONCILIATION and the call to repentance. That call is not about dwelling on our sins and being even more burdened by them, but the opposite: bringing them to God in sorrow and hope for forgiveness. It is a fitting time to approach Jesus in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and be able to approach Him in the Eucharist on Christmas with a renewed heart.

The final week of Advent is like the stillness of night just before dawn. All nature is waiting for the sunrise. This week is a time of special prayer during which the Church sings the **O** Antiphons each night from December 17 to 23. These antiphons are ageless sighs of deep longing. Each begins with a striking name for God. Slowly pray and meditate on these ancient scriptural gems each morning and evening this week:

December 17: O Wisdom

O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern All creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

December 18: O Adonai

O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, Who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, Who gave him your holy law on Sinai mountain; Come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

December 19: O Flower of Jesse

O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; the powerful stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

December 20: O Key of David

O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel Controlling at your will the gate of heaven; Come, break down the prison walls of death for those Who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, And lead your captive people into freedom.

December 21: O Dawn

O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, Sun of justice: Come, shine on those who dwell In darkness and the shadow of death.

December 22: O King

O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human Heart; O keystone of the mighty arch of humankind; Come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust.

December 23: O Emmanuel

O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people: Come and set us free, Lord our God.
