### Thoughts from Father Anthony





### Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B

Before Mary's big YES (fiat), there was confusion in her heart and mind and yet she pondered all that the angel had announced to her. Her constant reflection enlightened and enlivened her decision to accept the special calling to bear Jesus, the heart of the world.

Now we understand how Mary came to accept the angel Gabriel's revelation. Mary was full of grace and had deep faith. She had no doubt. Knowing it was the will of God, her faith prevailed and dominated.

Like Mary, may we never stop reflecting and examining ourselves. Through self introspection, we get to see our journey and how God manifests Himself in our life, consistently. Then let us develop the sense of fidelity. In such context of awareness as the servant of the Lord, Mary's faith was founded strongly on gratitude for what God has done for her by saying, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my savior because he has looked upon his lowly handmaid."

This is significant because there is a big difference between faith based on expectations of what God can do before us, and on faith based on gratitude for what we know that God has graciously done for us. In the former, we will serve God only with the assumption that He will grant our desires for miracles and signs. In the latter, which is the kind of Mary's faith, we will serve God because we are gratefully aware of the love and mercy He has shown for us.

We are called to imitate Mary's kind of faith. She accepted everything with a humble and thankful heart. Our faith would become conditional if our obedience to God is conditional. In reality, we would like God to serve us according to what we want and we want that we are in control. The truth is we must serve God according to His will for us and let us allow God to be in control.

King David, in today's First Reading, feels good proposing to build a house for God but the Lord replies, through the prophet Nathan, "Should you build me a house to dwell in? The Lord will establish a house for you." David wishes to feel in control of his relationship with God. "No," says the Lord, "I'm going to lead you, not the other way around." In contrast, the Annunciation story tells us how, with her yes (Fiat), Mary gives God total control. "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." She places all her life, in God's hands. She surrender to God. She is a model of faith.

The Second reading challenges us to have obedience of Faith to the only Wise God who can strengthen us. Thus, to have faith in God like Mary we hope that the best is yet to come especially during this time of turmoil. Christ will give us for sure light that brightens our dark side of life.

The journey towards Christmas is a journey of reflection. This year, what is significant about your Christmas journey? May we choose to be like Mary, and like her, closely wait to celebrate the birthday of our Savior. Amen.

The best way to give ourselves is to accept His will. And forever be grateful by praying, "Forever I will sing of the goodness of the Lord."









Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus. - Luke 1:26-38 Today, Luke tells us of the angel Gabriel's visit to Mary with his good news. "You have found favor with God," he tells her, "and you will bear a son." Not only that, Gabriel tells her that Jesus is the Son of God, and a throne in heaven awaits Him. What joyful news! Mary accepted the news and further learned that her cousin, Elizabeth, was expecting as well. Filled with the Holy Spirit, Mary went to Elizabeth, eager to share her joy. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that only faith can embrace the mysterious ways of God's almighty power. The Virgin Mary is the supreme model of this faith, for she believed that "nothing will be impossible with God." (CCC 273)

As we prepare for the celebration of Christmas, let us allow our faith to guide us as it did Mary.



Today we light the fourth candle on our Advent wreath. It is the *Angels Candle* which is the candle of joy and love, a reminder of the Good News that God has graced the world forever in the birth of His Son.

As the feast of the Nativity approaches, it is increasingly easy to forget that **the purpose of this celebration is to recall the love of God who took on our human flesh.** It is also easy to forget that if we truly make a roomy place in our hearts, our lives, and our celebrations, then the details of broken ornaments, etc. will be unimportant. Few of us have a prophet or an angel sent from heaven to speak the will of God to us. We are called to keep our ears, eyes, and minds open and seek the voices of God's messengers who are still alive, present, and working today. This is a time consuming effort but one that will be rewarding.

**Bishop Kulick writes:** As Bishop, it is one of my most important duties to call to mind our fundamental responsibility as Catholics to care for the needs of these too often forgotten and marginalized children of God. Christmas is the perfect opportunity to include in our gift-giving those, who like the Christ Child, could find no place to lay their heads, and for many, no food to sustain them. Your support of this collection allows those touched by poverty, violence, the slow economy, or brokenness to look beyond their present conditions and find the hope to work toward better circumstances.

**Christmas Wafers (Oplatki) are available.** There are four wafers per package (three white and one pink); the offering is \$2.00 per package.

The Christmas wafer symbolizes the unity of the family. According to beliefs, the bond of unity should exist between family members. The father is seen as the link in the unbroken chain of One Body, One Bread, One Christ, and One Church, while other family members join him in this eternal procession. Before partaking of the Christmas Eve meal, the family gathers around the table. The eldest member holds a large wafer and breaks off a piece to begin the ritual. The remaining wafer is passed on to another member while a prayer for loved ones is said. This continues until everyone at the table has a piece of the wafer. Finally, each family member gives wishes to every other family member, consuming a piece of wafer broken off of the wafer piece of the person to whom they were giving their wishes.
