
Sacrament of Baptism: By appointment. Prior to your baby's Baptism, you must be a registered, practicing member of this parish.

Thoughts from Father Anthony



The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph - Year B

We celebrate today the Feast of the Holy Family. Though the focus of our celebration is the family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we also dwell on our own family, as well as the family of humankind. For when the Word of God becomes flesh, Jesus Christ joins our family. Jesus experiences the situation in which the family finds itself, both the positive and the negative aspects, the lights and the shadows.

The feast today is an occasion for us to go back to the central reason of family and family life. We are threatened more than ever with the onslaught of materialism, a love of objects rather than a love for persons. Spouses may justify their unreasonable absence from the family because they are busy making money. They may easily compromise their valuable relationships because they want to prosper economically. Love then becomes absent; it is replaced by figures and frayed nerves. The children suffer most from the lack of presence and attention of parents. We may succeed in acquiring wealth but end up with a broken marriage and problematic children.

The present situation needs a drastic turnabout that must be initiated by parents to save their own families from such depersonalization and disturbing absenteeism. The essential mission of every family is not to gain wealth at the expense of meaningful relationships. Rather it is to create an atmosphere where love can grow and flourish among its members. If God wished to teach us that communion of love and holiness can be achieved merely through possessions, then Jesus should have been born to wealthy parents. If there were parents who should have worked hard, they were the parents of Jesus but, while money and working hard are important, Jesus was born to poor Mary and Joseph. This is to show us that in spite of deprivation and poverty, their foremost priority was to seek out the will of God in their lives. They would rather be pleasing to God than be the first in the eyes of humans and love among them was the fundamental element that defined the nature of their family as holy.

It is to be recognized, with compassion, that many families today experience a lot of anxieties, conflicts, and problems. Many are besieged and harassed by the demands of life. Do not be discouraged. Christ is telling us, "Do not be afraid." The Holy Family experienced the worst that could happen - poverty and persecution - but they remained true to God and to each other. They give us the inspiration and the assurance of God's loving presence every step of the way.

God will not answer our prayers if we are praying for a perfect family. We are making the wrong prayer, for there can be no family without problems. We must guard against the erroneous view that family life should be free from serious difficulties. A holy and loving family is not one in which trials do not occur, but one in which members work together to address family problems in the light of God's will. Perhaps there can never be a trial-free family, but each family can be a faithful family. The Holy Family of Nazareth showed us that possibility in our own families - to possess the right winning combination.

What does the Gospel teach us about today's celebration? The peaceful presentation of the Child Jesus in the Jerusalem Temple. Mary and Joseph are presented as a couple steeped in the tradition and religiosity of their people. Simeon prophesies that Jesus is a sign that will be contradicted, set for the fall and rise of many in Israel. This will cause a sword passing through the heart of Mary - and of many others. St. John Paul II presents the Holy Family as the prototype and example for all Christian families. The life of this family passes in silence in a small town; it experiences the trials of poverty, persecution, and exile yet, in all of these, it glorifies God in an incomparably exalted and pure way.

Christmas is the feast of families. It gathers family members in the heart of the home and around the crib where we find figures around the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Pope Francis encourages the faithful to contemplate the Christmas story - the story of the family - in the icon of the Christmas crèche to guide us to the meaning and importance of the Nativity scene. As families gather around the "nativity" or Christmas crèche, may they rediscover the importance of the family. The experience of the pandemic COVID-19 or war has taught us that God is our support, and our family is our place of refuge. More than ever, we rely on family members to support each other, as we face the trials and challenges brought about by the wars.

With the economy in recession everywhere, parents and adult members have to work harder and longer to tide the family through. Children have to be guided. Unnecessary expenses have to be forgone but the joy of Christmas cannot be cancelled or postponed until better times. The "Nativity," according to Pope Francis, "teaches us to contemplate Jesus, to experience God's love for us, to feel and believe that God is with us and that we are with him, his children, brothers and sisters all, thanks to that Child who is the Son of God and the Son of the Virgin Mary and to realize that in that knowledge we find true happiness."

As we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family, may we entrust each family to Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

Our **Merry Christmastime** unfolds with the blessing of a new year, the astonishing good news of peace on earth and with the treasures pondered within the heart of Mary.

New Year's Eve - as the year comes to a close, we look back and remember. We are both grateful for the many ways God has blessed us and sorrowful at the pain the year may have brought us. All around us today, we hear the nostalgic words of the Scottish song, "Auld Lange Syne" which evokes the memory of people and places from our recent and distant past. In faith we know that Christ, the beginning and the end, is present in every moment of our lives, uniting the people and events of the past, present, and future by His love. Name a good thing that happened during the past year and thank God for it; then mention a hope for the coming year.

New Year's Day - following the ancient tradition of celebrating the octave (eighth day) of an event, we celebrate again the mystery of Jesus' birth, but this time with our eyes on Mary. When we celebrate her as the Mother of God, we are at the same time celebrating the divinity of Jesus, who was truly human and truly God.







On New Year's Day, we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. How appropriate that on the first day of every year we honor Mary, the Holy Mother of God, for it was her willing obedience to God's plan that enabled the Incarnation and therefore initiated what in time became Christianity.

We invite everyone to join us as together we prayerfully welcome the New Year 2024.

January 1st is also the **World Day of Peace** and so we look to Mary, the Queen of Peace - who bore the Prince of Peace - as our model and inspiration for holding peace in our hearts, our communities and in our world.

The World Day of Prayer for Peace,

begun by Saint Pope Paul VI is celebrated on the first day of the New Year. On January 1st, the Holy Father asks that, in a special way, we pray for Peace on Earth.

Tuesday is the Feast of Saints Basil the Great and Gregory Nazianzen. They were great friends who helped to prepare the way of the Lord. Basil challenged people to live simply and care for the poor and dying. Gregory, though shy, became a great preacher.

Wednesday is the Feast of the Most Holy Name of Jesus. Through the particular efforts of Saint Bernardine of Siena, devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus was promoted through the inscription IHS (abbreviation of the Greek name for Jesus).

Thursday is the Feast of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton
She was a wife and mother of five children; foundress of
the first congregation for women religious in the USA
(the Sisters of Charity) who are devoted primarily to the
education of the poor and to teaching in parochial
schools. She is first native born citizen to be canonized.

Friday is the Feast of Saint John Neumann known for his holiness and learning, he was a promoter of parochial schools who authored two German catechisms. He was the first American bishop to be canonized.

We wish the year 2023 farewell and pray that 2024 brings us peace. We honor Mary from whose womb sprang the new life we have been celebrating these past eight days. We begin a New Year by raising our hearts and voices to our spiritual mother.

Pro-Life Rosary and Mass - Saturday, January 13


