

Thoughts from Father Anthony - Second Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B



What are you looking for? That was the question of Jesus to the apostles in our gospel today. The gospel event is an example of a divine initiative. God takes the first step. God does the first move. It is He who calls us first. God does not wait for us to search and search until we can find Him. God Himself goes out to meet us. St. Augustine said, "When we go to God we do not go to Him who hides Himself and keeps us at a distance. We go to Him who stands waiting for us, and who even takes the initiative by coming to meet us on the road of life."

Jesus began by asking the two men in today's gospel the most fundamental question in life, that is, What are you looking for? And Jesus invited them with His words, "*Come, and you will see.*"

We can also ask ourselves these questions: What are we looking for? What are our aims and goals in this life? What are we really trying to get out of our lives? People are searching for security. People dream of a safe life and sound position. They think of money or a family to make their lives happy and their future secured. Others might be searching for stability. These could come from permanent or rewarding careers. People could be working hard for prominence, for prestige, or for popularity. Some could be searching for peace, or for prosperity. People might be looking for success, or for their own salvation. Yet we are reminded in the scriptures, "Do not seek, what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not worry anymore. All the nations of the world seek for these things, and your Father knows that we need them. Instead, seek his kingdom, and these other things will be given you besides.

We must look first for God. We must first and foremost search for him and if we are searching for Jesus, let us imitate Philip. Let us introduce others to Jesus. It was the utmost joy of Andrew to bring his brother Simon to Jesus. His ardent desire was to share the glory and joy of meeting Jesus. Having discovered the friendship of Jesus, he spent his whole life in leading others to that friendship with Jesus. The imperative come, and you will see, are invitations for us to go to Jesus and experience him. It is a direct way of challenging us to find Jesus, to try Jesus, and to return to him.

The first reading describes how Yahweh called Samuel to His service and how the boy Samuel responded to Him, saying, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." Hence, God blessed him in the mission entrusted to him, and Samuel became an illustrious figure, ranking with Moses and David as a man of God.

In the Responsorial Psalm (Ps 40), the psalmist sings, "Behold, I come to do Your will," indicating that his vocation is to obey, to do what God commands him to do. In the second reading, St. Paul explains to the Corinthians that their Divine call is a call to holiness. Hence, they need to keep their bodies pure and souls holy, because by Baptism they have become parts of Christ's Body and the temples of the Holy Spirit.

Today's Gospel also describes the call or vocation of the first apostles and challenges us to invite others to Christ by our Christian witnessing. Now the divine initiative of God demands from us two things:

First is to answer his invitation to come and see. We must discover him and, connected with this response, is a responsibility to share Jesus with others.

Second is to remain in that friendship with Jesus. We must stand by him and stay with him forever. And we should end up as his witnesses.

Remember, Saint Augustine said, "My soul is restless until it rests unto to you O Lord."


(Meditation based on today's Gospel - John 1: 35-42)

"Come and See," Jesus said to the disciples who were curious to know about Him. Today He whispers this invitation into the deepest place of our heart. Have courage - go, and see what Christ has to show you.


