
New Parishioners, Welcome! Please register as soon as possible.

Sacrament of Marriage: Requires parish membership by at least one of the parties for six months prior to making arrangements for marriage. Weddings should be scheduled one year in advance.



Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass @2001, 1998, 1970 CCD.

Thoughts from Father Anthony - 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B



The call to repentance and conversion is a central theme in the teachings of Jesus and the message of the Gospel. It involves recognizing our need for God's mercy and forgiveness, turning away from sin, and turning towards God with sincerity and eagerness. In the first reading, Jonah is initially reluctant to go to Nineveh because he sees it as a city of godlessness and corruption; however, when the people of Nineveh hear the word of God, they respond with repentance and receive God's mercy and forgiveness. This shows that even those who may seem lost or hopeless can experience a change of heart and find reconciliation with God.

In the second reading, Saint Paul reminds us that time is running out and that we should leave behind worldly distractions and focus on serving God. This highlights the urgency of repentance and conversion, as we are called to change our lives and align them with God's will in order to attain eternal life with Christ.

In the Gospel passage, Jesus proclaims the kingdom of God and calls people to repent and believe in the good news. Some immediately leave what they were doing and follow Him. This demonstrates the importance of responding to the call of Jesus and embracing the message of the Gospel, which includes repentance and conversion.

The concept of repentance and conversion is about acknowledging our need for God, turning away from sin, and embracing a new way of life centered on God's love and mercy. It is a continuous process of growth and transformation, guided by the teachings of Jesus and the grace of the Holy Spirit. Thus, let us pray like in our responsorial psalm, *Teach me your ways, O Lord*.

The kingdom of God is still at hand. We must change our ways and bring the Good News of Jesus Christ to all peoples. Jesus starts His work by the Sea of Galilee, not in a synagogue. The sea is rough, unpredictable, spontaneous, vast, and mysterious. On the other hand, the synagogue, is a product of human convention that rigidly separates the "pure" from the "impure" - categories created by human beings themselves - because if you are non-Jews, according to them, you are impure and not part of the chosen people of God and discrimination follows. Jesus calls not well-known Pharisees or Sadducees but unnamed fishermen. The Pharisees and the Sadducees draw authority from being acknowledged by name; however, to work with God and for God is to declare that there is only one name to whom every knee should bend in the heavens, on the earth, or under the earth. That is God and the credit is His alone.

Jesus begins His work by calling the first disciples by twos. Jesus calls the disciples by two; He will later commission them to preach by twos. The beauty and meaning of life and the presence of God are best savored in the joy of fellowship. Jesus preaches: *"For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them"* (Mt 18:20). To work with God, for God, and in God is to uphold the values of community, peace, communion. Through evangelization, converts are going to turn their hearts to God and to see God in a church, that is, a community of brothers and sisters. These men whom Jesus called were unprepared - they did not belong to the religious groups at that time but Christ approached them in their life situation as they carried out their everyday chores. This speaks of the creative word of Christ that can transform ordinary situations into invitations of God's grace.

In the plain and usual activity of fishing, the fishermen were challenged by Christ to follow Him so that they could be "fishers of men". In our everyday exercise of common chores and in common places, there is always the standing summon of Christ to follow Him. We only have to be responsible in discovering the Godgiven possibilities in our ordinary affairs; therefore, in what ever you do, do it with love and God will dwell in your heart. The glory of God is when man fulfills the task that God gives in his or her life. (Mark 1: 14-20)

The Practice of Faith

When Jonah warned the people of Nineveh of God's impending punishment, they promptly repented. When Jesus summoned the Galilean fishermen to participate in the proclamation of God's kingdom, they promptly joined him. When we hear Saint Paul urging the Christians in Corinth not to become preoccupied by worldly concerns, we hear that same invitation to ask ourselves if we are truly living as God intends or if we need to make changes in our lives.

Take some time this week to scrutinize your life. What do you spend time on? What do you spend money on? When Jesus called His first disciples, they immediately left everything behind. Is there something in your life that you need to walk away from completely?

Monday, January 22 - Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children

On this anniversary of the Supreme Count decision, *Roe vs. Wade*, all dioceses of the United States shall observe "a day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion." (GIRM, no. 373). Amidst the cultural challenges surrounding the sanctity of life, we come together on this day to pray for the protection of unborn children and to advocate for a culture that respects the dignity of *every* human life from conception to natural death.

Tuesday is the Feast of Saints Vincent & Marianne Cope Saint Vincent, a Spanish-born poet, sings his praises in his narrative poem *Peristephanon*. He is patron of wineproducers. Marianne Cope, a Sister of Saint Francis of Syracuse, NY, is known for her charitable works and virtuous deeds. She cared for the lepers on the island of Molokai and was canonized by Pope Benedict in 2012.

Wednesday is the Feast of Saint Francis de Sales We honor Saint Francis DeSales, the patron saint of writers and journalists, on this day. May his intercession guide us in spreading the message of love and truth

Thursday is the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul marking the moment when Saul, a persecutor of Christians, encountered Christ on the road to Damascus and was transformed into the Apostle Paul, a fervent evangelizer and one of the greatest saints in Christian history.

Friday is the Feast of Saints Timothy and Titus

Timothy and Titus were companions of Saint Paul who were entrusted to proclaim the "good news." The kingdom, like a seed, grows slowly to maturity.


