### Thoughts from Father Anthony - First Sunday of Lent - Year B



A lot of people are going through a financial "desert" these days due to the global recession. In today's gospel (Mk. 1, 12-15), we hear of Jesus who literally had a desert experience for 40 days. Two things happened to Jesus in the desert: "He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to Him." In the desert - and in whatever desert - there is desolation but, also, there is consolation. One thing for sure, the desert is not the place for desserts. The desert is about survival, endurance and stamina. The best and the worst in us come out in the desert and we also come out either better or worse from any desert experience.

The desert makes us realize what is really important and what is really basic in life. Anyone who has not gone through any desert does not know life at all, for life is definitely not about being comfortable, predictable, frivolous, fainthearted and superficial. We are very vulnerable in the desert where we are exposed to the external elements, but surprisingly, we also discover out there that we have a lot of reserved strength within. Most importantly, we discover in our littleness and vulnerability the presence and the power of something or someone greater than ourselves. Yes, a stay in the desert has a value. One cannot rush through, and need not flee from, the desert; for in the desert, one learns to let go and to let God. In the desert, once again, we know who we are, and we know who God is.


The 40 days of Lent should remind us of one basic rule when we go through the desert, and that is, to travel light. We are told to carry only what is essential for the journey, and to rid ourselves of extra luggage, which are not necessary but will, in fact, only make the journey difficult and cumbersome. The discipline of Lent, which necessitates penance, prayer, fasting and good deeds, will lead us to dispose of our unnecessary physical, emotional and spiritual baggage.

A few days ago, we began the Season of Lent. As the Spirit "drove Jesus out into the desert," we are also invited during this season to go to the desert. It is an invitation for us to spend some time in solitude and silence in order to feel and experience the presence of God. This is what Jesus is talking about when He said something about prayer: "But when you pray, go to your inner room, close the door and pray to your Father in secret" (Mt 6:6). Even in the midst of all the hassle and bustle of city life, we can go to our desert, the inner room of our hearts, by closing our senses to the distractions of this world. This can be done by mortifying our senses. This is what Jesus did in the desert. He prayed and fasted for forty days so that there are no distractions in his intimate communication with the Father but the desert is not only that of solitude, but also of temptations.

The world we live in is already a desert. It is full of wild beasts waiting to devour us at any moment of our weakness and slackness but then the response is not by ignoring them or running away from them. Temptations are part of our everyday life in this world and they also are an essential element in our journey of faith. Like Jesus, we have to face these temptations relying solely on God and His protection against all enemies. Temptations are tests. When we overcome these tests with God's help, we emerge stronger, wiser and better followers of Jesus. They remind us of how weak we are, and how strong our enemy is. This realization makes us humbler and moves us to rely on God's power all the more.

Hence, the readings today also invite us to go to the desert of temptations – not to expose ourselves to temptations, but to face the hard realities of life in this world, with all the problems, confusion and enticements. This is an opportunity for us to realize that we need God at every moment of our lives.

The Season of Lent is, therefore, our desert experience. Let us be aware of God present in our life. Let us also be aware of the lurking enemy around and inside us and if we just strive to stay close to God, through our prayers and acts of charity and penance, He will surely give us all the graces we need to overcome all these dangers to our soul and to grow in holiness and Christian perfection.



In the desert, Jesus endured forty days of hardship and temptation but He did not endure it alone: "the angels ministered to him" the Gospel tells us. Remember that you do not face Lent alone. God is beside you in your journey to the desert.



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
