

Thoughts from Father Anthony - Second Sunday of Lent - Year B



Today is the second Sunday of Lent. All the three readings center on Jesus, the Son of God who was transfigured on His way to suffering. Abraham was willing to sacrifice his son Isaac in the (First Reading), so God gave His Only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ, for our sake (in the Second Reading). That same Son who had foretold His suffering was transfigured to offset the scandal of the cross (in the Gospel). What would happen to their faith if they were not given a glimpse of optimism prior to His tragic death? Such love of Christ made Him decide to bring the disciples to a high mountain. This was to allow them to witness His transfiguration where "his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleach could make them."

Mark the evangelist narrates, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him" - the Father's thundering voice came echoing to disciples Peter, James, and John, who were with the Lord at that time. Such loving devotion of the Father to the Son, a protective and eternal love, an adoring affection made Jesus blush, shine with joy, foretaste His spirit up, and made him so happy that He became very radiant, beaming, and glowing. Of course, the term used in the Gospel for this is "transfiguration." Love is transformative. It heals our wounds, changes our minds, and opens our hearts. It comforts and strengthens us as it also inspires us to do the same to others. We can go for days without food, but an empty heart deprived of love makes our suffering meaningless and our sacrifices pointless. In the words of St. John Paul II in *Redemptoris Hominis, "Man cannot live without love."*

The first reading explains how his trusting faith in his God's mercy and power and his blind obedience to his God's order to sacrifice the only son of his old age, transformed the life of Abraham, making him the supreme model of Faith. In the Second reading: God showed His love for us by allowing the transformation of the glorious preaching and healing ministry of His Son to a tragic end, proving that God's love has no limits. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 116) speaks of God's distress at the death of anyone. *"Too costly in the eyes of the LORD is the death of His faithful."* In the Transfiguration story in today's Gospel, Jesus is revealed in His Heavenly glory, superior to Moses and Elijah.

The primary purpose of Jesus' Transfiguration was to allow Him to consult His heavenly Father and ascertain His plan for His Son's suffering, death and Resurrection. God's secondary aim was to make Jesus' chosen disciples aware of Jesus' Divine glory, so that they might discard their worldly ambitions and dreams of a conquering political Messiah and might be strengthened in their time of trial. A third aim was to give Jesus the conviction that He will be the Son of God of His loving Father even during His suffering and death. Finally, by describing the theophany of Jesus' Transfiguration, the Gospel gives us a glimpse of the Heavenly glory awaiting those who do God's will by putting their trusting Faith in Him.

Every sacrament we receive transforms our lives: for example, **Baptism** transforms us into children of God and heirs of heaven. **Confirmation** transforms us to brave witnesses of and warriors for Christ. **Reconciliation** transforms sinners to saints. The "transfiguration" in the Holy Mass is the source of our strength: In each Holy Mass, the bread and wine we offer on the altar are transformed into the crucified and risen, living body and blood of Jesus by transubstantiation. Just as Jesus' transfiguration strengthened the apostles in their time of trial, each holy Mass should be our source of Heavenly strength against temptations, and our renewal during Lent. In addition, our Holy Communion with the living Jesus should be the source of our daily "transfiguration," transforming our minds and hearts so that we may do more good, by humble and selfless service to others.

Christ's transfiguration gives us a message of encouragement and hope especially during this time. In moments of doubt and during our dark moments of despair and hopelessness, pain and suffering, the thought of our future transformation in Heaven will help us to reach out to God and to listen to His consoling words: "This is my beloved son." Let us offer our Lenten sacrifices to our Lord so that, through these practices of Lent and through the acceptance of our daily crosses, we may grow closer to Him in His suffering, may share in the carrying of His cross and finally may share the glory of His second "transfiguration," namely, His Resurrection. We know that problems are just temporary, that there will be light at the end of the tunnel. St. Paul reminds us, *"for those who love God everything works out to their advantage."*

LENT is a time for new life in Christ - a time when Christians pause to listen to the voice of God calling us back to Him. In these days of Lent, the Church sets aside time for us to evaluate and reform our lives in light of Jesus' word to us: *"The kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel."* This Lent, let us turn to Jesus and ask Him to show us His love and give us the ability to follow Him.





Lenten Meditation - Preparing the Heart

Confession does for the soul what preparing the land does for the field. Before the farmer sows the seed, he works the acreage, removing the rocks and pulling the stumps. He knows that seed grows better if the land is prepared. Confession is the act of inviting God to walk the acreage of our hearts. "There is a rock of greed over here, Father, I can't budge it … that tree of guilt near the fence? Its roots are long and deep, and may I show you some dry soil, too crusty for seed?"

God's seed grows better if the soil of the heart is cleared and so the Father and the Son walk the field together; digging and pulling, preparing the heart for fruit. Confession invites the Father to work the soil of the soul. - In the Grip of Grace
