
Sacrament of Baptism: By appointment. Prior to your baby's Baptism, you must be a registered, practicing member of this parish.

Thoughts from Father Anthony - Third Sunday of Easter - Year B



Our readings today remind us that the purpose of the suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus was to save us from our sins and we, the baptized, will be a living witnesses to this reality in our daily lives.

The first reading taken from the Acts of the Apostles, gives us Peter's second sermon addressing the Jewish assembly at the Portico of Solomon in Jerusalem. Peter forcefully shows how the messianic prophecies have been fulfilled in the crucified and


risen Jesus and challenges the Jews to repent and turn toward God so that their sins may be wiped away. In the second reading, John answers doubts raised by the heretics of his time, asserting the fundamental Christian doctrine that Jesus' death was a sacrifice offered as expiation for our sins. Today's Gospel describes Jesus' appearance on the evening of His Resurrection to His apostles who were in the locked Upper Room, the Cenacle. We see Jesus remove the doubts of His apostles about His Resurrection by inviting them to touch Him and by eating a piece of cooked fish. Jesus explains how the prophecies have been fulfilled in Him. Then He commissions them to bear witness to Him and preach "repentance and forgiveness of sins in His Name" after receiving the Holy Spirit.

We need to share the apostles' *Upper Room Experience* in the Holy Mass: The same Jesus who, in the Upper Room - the Cenacle, prepared the disciples for their preaching and witnessing mission, is present with us in the Eucharistic celebration. In the "Liturgy of the Word" of God, Jesus speaks to us. In the "Liturgy of the Eucharist," Jesus becomes our spiritual food and drink. Thus, today's Gospel scene is repeated every Sunday on our parish altars. Like the early disciples, we come together to repent of our sins, express our gratitude for blessings received, listen to God's word, and offer our lives to God along with our petitions and His gifts of consecrated Bread and Wine. We also consume the spiritual food Jesus supplies, thus gaining the strength necessary for sharing Christ's message with the entire world, mainly by living transparent Christian lives. Jesus needs us as witnesses to continue His mission. Jesus needs Spirit-filled followers to be His eyes, ears, hands, and feet, to bear witness to His love, mercy and forgiveness by our interactions with our brothers and sisters. Our daily lives are meant to serve as a means for us to experience and share the risen Lord with others. Just as the disciples experienced the risen Lord in their community, let us learn to recognize the presence of Jesus in our own homes, social service centers, nursing facilities, hospitals, workplaces, and schools. Jesus wants us to be a community which shares and cares, a community which knows how to recognize Jesus in the poor, the marginalized, the sick that is, in everyone – and does so.

Today, we have an abundance of preachers, teachers, speakers, and opinion makers but we lack witnesses! We lack people who will show others, especially the young, that the Word of God is true, effective, and relevant. The Good News is never outdated, old or obsolete. Modernism, consumerism, atheism, or even pluralism may have become popular, but their effectivity has always been found absent. For these ideologies to be discomfit, we only need witnesses to the Gospel. The Word of God and His Deeds lasts and are always relevant. For Saint Augustine, "It is a beauty ever ancient yet ever new."

In the concrete, do not just tell your children not to tell a lie. Show them your honesty. Do not just tell them not to steal. Show them control and sacrifice. Do not just tell them to be respectful. Show them respect by how you treat them and others. Do not just tell them to pray and fear God, show them true piety and authentic religiosity. In other words, live by example and show to others our experience of the risen Lord.

Remember . . . "Action speaks louder than words."



The risen Christ appeared to the disciples and said, "Peace be with you." (Luke 24:35-48)

In today's Gospel, Jesus appears to the disciples after His resurrection.
Once He made it clear to them that He really had returned, He expressed a

bit of disappointment in the fact that after all of His preaching, miracles, explanations of the prophets, the Law of Moses, and the Psalms, His own disciples still didn't seem to believe it was really Him. Finally, in verse 45, Saint Luke writes: "Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures."

Sometimes when God appears in our path, we do not recognize Him. In these moments, Jesus invites us to reach out and touch Him. Remember that Christ is real, Christ is alive, and Christ stands before each one of us - so reach out. Touch Him.

Saint Paul, Apostle to the Gentiles, was the most prolific Christian missionary of all time. Due to a miraculous experience that he had on the road to Damascus, he went from persecuting early Christians to traveling all over the region preaching the Gospel of Jesus.

Remember Military Children

FIRST EUCHARIST

The season of First Eucharist is here. Invitations pour in as the new communicants, mostly seven years old, gather extended families for their first reception of the Eucharist. Recently the celebrations are often on Sunday in the regular gatherings of the faith community where it becomes clear that First Eucharist is meant to initiate a regular pattern of reception and that there is to be a second, third, hundredth, and thousandth celebration.

Eastern Catholics and Orthodox children follow a different plan since they are given a taste of the consecrated wine at their baptism as infants. We Western Christians delay until "the age of reason," but many years ago, Communion was not for children at all. Twelve to fourteen was the typical age for Roman Catholics to receive for the first time and, in those days, this was a transition into the adult world of work and marriage. The custom did not begin to shift to childhood until reforms set in place by Pope Saint Pius X began to take hold in the 1920s. If you are going to a First Eucharist, you can give thanks that the table of the Lord is today open so much more lavishly than before.

During the Easter season, we hear how the disciples encounter the Risen Christ at different times and in different ways, all the while trying to understand the meaning of the Resurrection. We, too, contemplate the implications of the Resurrection and consider how we see the Risen Lord in our lives. It helps us to gather as Church, where we can seek the presence of Christ as we worship: in the assembly, in its ministers, in the word of God, in the Holy Sacrifice, and in the Eucharist. Let us pray that we may better discern the Lord in our midst.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us that we are taught that our faculties make us capable of "coming to a knowledge of the existence of a personal God." If we are ever to be able to form a personal relationship with God, it was necessary to give us both the revelation (in His Son Jesus Christ) and the capacity to welcome this revelation in faith. (CCC 35) If even Jesus' disciples had trouble understanding their faith, we know how much better we must work to preserve it.

The resurrected Jesus taught the disciples how they were witnesses to the Scriptures being fulfilled in His suffering, death, and resurrection and that forgiveness of sins was to be preached in His Name. How might you share your faith this week at home or at work?
