Thoughts from Father Anthony - Second Sunday of Easter - Year B

Divine Mercy Sunday

If you are called up to a place and blindfolded and a bucket full of water is placed in front of you, you are asked if it was empty or full. What are ways you can learn the answer to such an inquiry without removing the blindfold? Accordingly, there are three ways we can learn to answer such a question: One way is to reach into the bucket and feel if there is water in it. In other words, you can experience firsthand if the bucket is full or empty. This way of learning is called experiencing. It's knowledge that we acquire by firsthand experience. This way of acquiring knowledge is called experiencing. It's knowledge that our senses give us.

The second way of learning if the bucket has water or has none is to drop an object like a coin, into it. If the object hits the bottom of the bucket with a loud or ringing sound, you know the bucket is empty. On the other hand, if the object hits with a slurp or a splash, you know the bucket contains water. This way of acquiring knowledge is called reasoning. A third way to learn if the bucket contains water is to ask someone you trust. The person could look into the bucket and tell you if it has water in it. This way of learning is called believing. It's knowledge that we acquire by faith. But of the three ways of acquiring knowledge, that is, by experiencing, reasoning and believing, by which way do we learn most of our knowledge? Is it by experiencing, by reasoning or by believing? If we said believing, then you and I are correct. It is because some experts estimate that we learn as much as 80 percent of our knowledge in this way. Few of us travelled around the world. The only way we know about most countries is by what others tell us. In other words, we trust the people who have been there.

Today is Second Sunday of Easter. The Second Sunday of Easter is called the Day of the Doubting Thomas. It is because every year during this Sunday, the gospel being used is about Thomas who doubts that the Lord is raised from the dead. He doubts this fact. It is because when the other apostles report to him that the Lord is risen and they have seen him, he said that unless he sees the mark of the nails in His hands and puts his finger into the nail marks and put his hands into His side, he will not believe (v. 25). His way of acquiring knowledge is that of experiencing. Ours is different in acquiring religious knowledge. It is by way of believing. It is because most of our religious knowledge about Jesus comes from what the Scriptures and early Christians had said and we believe in them. "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

The first reading, taken from Acts, stresses the corporal acts of mercy practiced by the early Christian community before the Jews and the Romans started persecuting them. The second reading, taken from John's first Letter, deals with practicing both corporal and spiritual works of mercy by obeying God's Old Testament commandments and focusing on Jesus 'commandment of loving others as He loves us, with selfless, sacrificial, agape love. Loving others as Jesus loves us also demands that we treat others with God's mercy and compassion.

Today's Gospel vividly reminds us of how Jesus instituted the Sacrament of Reconciliation, a sacrament of Divine Mercy. The Risen Lord gave his apostles the power to forgive sins with the words, "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (Jn 20:19-23) Presenting the doubting Thomas' famous profession of Faith, "My Lord and my God," (Jn 20:28) the Gospel illustrates how Jesus showed Divine Mercy to the doubting apostle and emphasizes the importance of Faith.

We need to accept God's invitation to celebrate and practice mercy in our Christian lives. One way the Church celebrates God's mercy throughout the year is through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Finding time for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is another good way to receive and give thanks for Divine Mercy but it is mainly through the corporal and spiritual works of mercy that we practice mercy in our daily lives and become eligible for God's merciful judgment. Let us ask God for the Faith that culminates in self-surrender to God and that leads us to serve those we encounter with love. Living Faith enables us to see the risen Lord in everyone and gives us the willingness to render to each one our loving service.

The spiritual Fathers prescribe the following traditional means to grow in the living and dynamic faith of St. Thomas the Apostle: **First**, we must come to know Jesus personally and intimately by our daily and meditative reading of the Bible. **Next**, we must strengthen our Faith through our personal and community prayer. **Third**, we must share in the Divine Life of Jesus by frequenting the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Holy Eucharist. St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa) presents it this way: "*If we pray, we will believe; if we believe, we will love; if we love, we will serve. Only then we put our love of God into action.*" Believing is doing.


DIVINE MERCY

Saint John Paul II named the Second Sunday of Easter Sunday of Divine Mercy in response to Saint Faustina Kowalska's Divine Mercy devotion, which offered spiritual comfort to hearts worldwide. Pope Francis challenges us to make the comfort that we receive a gift we gladly share, saying that because mercy was first shown to us, we are therefore called to show mercy ourselves. The clearest expression of merciful love, says Francis, is pardoning others. He acknowledges how difficult it can be to forgive sometimes but, if we are to achieve peace in our hearts, pardon is the tool that has been put into our very fallible hands.

The necessary condition for living joyfully? We must let go of anger, hatred, revenge and violence. A tall order in a world seemingly bent on the destruction of every peaceful impulse. May Divine Mercy Sunday remind us that Jesus made mercy our life's ideal and a criterion for our faith's credibility: "Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy." - Matthew 5:7
